

Winter storm to bring impactful snow late tonight, Wednesday

An impactful winter storm is forecast to bring moderate to heavy snowfall to the Mid-Missouri River Valley starting late Tuesday night, through much of Wednesday. A Winter Storm Warn-

ing will go into effect for all of Northwest Missouri and Northeast Kansas from midnight Tuesday, Feb. 11 to 9 P.M. Wednesday, Feb. 12. Total snow accumulations of 4 to 8 inches are anticipated across the warning area from the Iowa border southward to the Kansas

City metro, encompassing the entire Highway 36 corridor. The highest snowfall totals are most likely along and north of Highway 36, where 5 to 8 inches of snow is forecast. Locations south of Highway 36 to the I-70 corridor are expected to receive 4 to 7

inches of snow, including the Kansas City metro. While snow is forecast along and north of I-70, a light glazing of ice will be possible in parts of central Missouri, well south of the I-70 corridor. Difficult travel conditions are expected through the warning

period due to snow covered roadways and reduced visibility. Wednesday morning and evening commutes will likely be impacted by the hazardous conditions. Consider avoiding travel Wednesday if at all possible. If you must travel, do so with

extreme caution and have extra supplies on hand. Bitterly cold air is forecast to arrive Wednesday night through much of Thursday, resulting in minimal melting and a likely continuation of tough travel conditions.

City crews, emergency departments prepare for winter storm

News-Press NOW's Storm Tracker Meteorologists are predicting approximately five to eight inches of snow to begin around midnight on Tuesday evening. City of St. Joseph road crews have been out pre-treating streets ahead of the predicted winter storm and emergency departments are preparing to respond to crashes due to reduced visibility and impacted roadways. According to the News-Press NOW's Storm Tracker team, A Winter Storm Warning will go into effect for all of Northwest Missouri

and Northeast Kansas from midnight Tuesday to 9 PM Wednesday, as significant snowfall is forecast to impact the region. Greg Bolon, MoDOT Northwest District maintenance and traffic engineer, says road crews have been salting the roads since the beginning of the week to prepare for the weather. "Once it does start snowing, it'll start reacting with that salt and keep it from bonding to the pavement, so it buys us time because with the 20-county area in Northwest Missouri, we don't have trucks to get everywhere at the same time," Bolon explained. The weather forecast is

predicting 3 to 4 inches of snow on the low end and 6 to 8 inches on the high-end beginning Tuesday night and continuing into Wednesday morning. Snow-covered roads and periods of limited visibility are anticipated through Wednesday and the Missouri State Highway Patrol is urging drivers to stay home until the day after the snowfall, if possible. "If we do get what they are predicting, unnecessary travel, I would not recommend it," said Sergeant Shane Hux with the Missouri State Highway Patrol. "If you do have to get out in those conditions and the roadways are snow covered, Please see CREWS/Page A3

Preparing as another winter storm approaches

With five to eight inches of snow expected on Wednesday, officials are advising residents to prepare even through this storm isn't expected to be as rough as the blizzard that hit the region in January. City of St. Joseph Emergency Manager Bill Lamar shared positives that he saw in response to the big snow storm in the beginning of the year. "It worked out really well because it was fairly well predicted," Lamar said. "It actually did impact about the way they were saying it would." Just like last time, crews have been out well in advanced pre-treating streets. Lamar reminds residents to have patience as crews will work

to clear streets. Residents that will be driving during the storm are advised to have an emergency kit. "Anytime you might have a breakdown, might get your car stuck, you will want to have an emergency kit," Lamar said. "Also have your cell phones charged and ready to go so if you do have to call somebody in a hurry you are not stuck." Emergency kits can include a blanket, hats, gloves, bottled water and other necessities. Remembering to have the car filled up with gas beforehand is critical as well. Shovels and snow scrapers will be needed for this upcoming storm and General Manager at Ace Hardware Greg Eagleburger Please see APPROACH/Page A3

Savannah School District contractor pleads guilty to three federal financial felonies

A Savannah resident and former full-time employee of the school district there faces sentencing after pleading guilty to federal charges involving financial misconduct. Anthony S. Moon pleaded guilty to three federal counts, including theft from a program receiving federal funds, wire fraud and theft from an employee benefit

plan, which were filed by the United States Attorney for the Western District of Missouri in late January. Moon began work as a full-time school district accountant in 2018 and continued until August 2020, when he went to work for St. Joseph tax preparer Parker & Associates, where he served as owner and president, according to a court document filed in the case. Moon continued to work with the Savan-

nah School District as a part-time contractor. He also had another business named A.S. Moon Accounting and Income Tax. The United States Attorney for the Western District of Missouri alleged that Moon would enter the school district's office building after hours and take blank checks that were not intended to be used, according to a court document in the case. From about January

2023 to November 2023, Moon prepared seven checks from the district's checking account and made deposits to his bank accounts, resulting in a total loss of \$63,000 from the fraudulent checks, according to court documents. Moon also used the school district's checking account to make \$29,747 worth of payments to his and his wife's credit cards for Please see GUILTY/Page A3

Netanyahu threatens to resume fighting in Gaza if hostages aren't released Saturday

JERUSALEM | Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Tuesday threatened to withdraw from the ceasefire in Gaza and directed troops to prepare to resume fighting Hamas if the militant group does not r elease more hostages on Saturday.

Hamas said Monday — and reiterated Tuesday — that it planned to delay the release of three more hostages after accusing Israel of failing to meet the terms of the ceasefire, including by not allowing an agreed-upon number of tents and other aid into Gaza.

Amid the mounting tensions, U.S. President Donald Trump emboldened Israel to call for the release of even more remaining hostages on Saturday.

Trump questions ceasefire's durability

After meeting with Jordan's King Abdul-lah II at the White House on Tuesday, Trump predicted Hamas would not release all the remaining hostages as he had demanded.

"I don't think they're going to make the deadline, personally," the president said of Hamas. "They want to play tough guy. We'll see how tough they are."

Since the ceasefire took effect, Hamas has released 21 hostages in a series of five exchanges for more than 730 Palestinian prisoners. A second phase calls for the return of all remaining hostages and an indefinite extension of the truce. However, Trump's statements about both the pending releases and plans for post-war Gaza have destabilized its fragile architecture.

It wasn't immediately clear whether Netan-yahu's threat referred to the three hostages

scheduled for release on Saturday or all the remaining hostages, which would be a departure from the terms of the ceasefire. Ne-tanyahu's office said it "welcomed President Trump's demand."

As Trump spoke to reporters in Washington and reasserted his demands, an Israeli official who spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss a private meeting, said Israel was "sticking to Trump's announcement regarding the release of the hostages. Namely, that they will all be released on Saturday."

Netanyahu's office also said it ordered the military to mobilize troops on and around the Gaza Strip in preparation for scenarios that could arise.

Trump has said Israel should cancel the en-tire ceasefire if all of the roughly 70 hostages aren't freed by Saturday. Hamas brushed off his threat Tuesday, doubling down on its claim that Israel has violated the ceasefire and warned that it would only continue releasing hostages if all parties adhered to the ceasefire.

"Trump must remember there is an agree-ment that must be respected by both parties. This is the only way to bring back prisoners," Hamas spokesman Sami Abu Zuhri said Tues-day. "The language of threats has no value; it only complicates matters."

The group later condemned Trump's White House remarks, saying they amounted to a "call for ethnic cleansing" and accusing Trump of seeking to "liquidate the Palestinian cause and deny the national rights of the Palestinian people."

Alabama seeks to join states that allow the death penalty for child rape

MONTGOMERY, Ala. | Alabama lawmakers on Tuesday advanced legislation that would allow child rapists to be sentenced to death as some Republicans hope to entice the U.S. Supreme Court to revisit the decision banning capital punishment for such crimes.

The Alabama House of Representatives voted 86-5 for the bill that would allow prosecutors to pursue the death penalty when an adult is convicted of rape or sodomy of a child under 12. The legislation now moves to the Alabama Senate.

Florida and Tennessee passed similar bills in the last two years and at least six other state legislatures have introduced similar measures over that same period, according to the Death Penalty Information Center.

The death penalty for child rape or sexual as-sault is unconstitutional under current Supreme Court precedent. The U.S. Supreme Court in 2008 ruled that the death penalty for child rape

is unconstitutional. Justices in the 5-4 decision in the case arising from Louisiana stated that the death penalty is not a "proportional punishment" for the crime and would violate the Eighth Amend-ment's ban on cruel and unusual punishment.

Republican Rep. Matt Simpson, a former prosecu-tor who is sponsoring the legislation, said the goal is to get the Supreme Court to revisit the decision.

"This is the worst of the worst offenses you can do," Simpson said after the vote, adding that the worst crimes deserve the harshest punishment. "That's something that the child has to live with for the rest of their life."

Alabama lawmakers who spoke out against the bill said they had moral opposition to the death penalty. Another questioned the wis-dom of passing something unconstitutional under current Supreme Court precedent and that would likely prompt litigation.

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Senate Republicans vow action to boost border funds after briefing with Trump officials

WASHINGTON — Citing warnings from President Donald Trump’s border czar, Senate Republicans vowed Tuesday to move quickly on a budget plan that could pave the way for the passage of about \$340 billion in additional border security and defense spending.

Meanwhile, House Republicans are trying to keep pace, hoping to unveil their own budget effort as soon as Wednesday that would also look to extend trillions of dollars in tax cuts passed in Trump’s first term.

GOP senators are anxious to make progress on key aspects of Trump’s domestic agenda. They heard Tuesday from Russ Vought, director of the White House Office of Management and Budget, and Tom Homan, the former acting U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement director, who is playing a key advisory role in Trump’s second term. Both stressed the urgent need for more border resources.

“We’re not building a wall, folks. We’re hitting a wall,” said Sen. Lindsey Graham, the Republican chairman of the Senate Budget Committee. “They need the money and they need it now.”

Graham’s committee is taking up a budget plan for more border and defense spending on Wednesday and Thursday. The plan directs the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs to spend up to \$175 billion and the Senate Armed Services Committee to spend up to \$150 billion.

Graham said other committees will be instructed to come up with spending reductions from other government programs to pay for the border and defense funds, but he was unwilling to discuss specifics or his preferences, saying “there are a bunch of things out there” that could be cut.

“I’m hoping the authorizing committees have thought long and hard about where they can find savings,” Graham said.

The Senate plan calls for

the added defense and border security spending to take place over four years and will be paid for over that same timeframe, Graham said.

Democrats worry that Republicans will look to Medicaid, which provides health insurance coverage for the poor, for the majority of savings.

“Democrats in the Senate will go to the mat to stop any cuts to Medicaid that will increase costs and take away health care from everyday Americans,” Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., said after Graham unveiled the budget plan.

Republicans have been debating since last year whether to enact the bulk of Trump’s agenda in one or two pieces of legislation. The Senate is moving on a two-bill track, while the House is moving on a one-bill track. It’s unclear which side will win out in the end.

House Speaker Mike Johnson said details of that chamber’s budget plan would probably be rolled out Tuesday night, but Majority Leader Steve Scalise subsequently said he expected the unveiling to take place Wednesday with the House Budget Committee taking votes on Thursday.

That’s a bit behind the ambitious schedule that Johnson had set in January even as he now insists

“we are right on the schedule that we need to be on.”

The budget plans being crafted are just the first step in an arduous and complicated legislative process. But it’s a necessary step for unlocking a pathway that allows Republicans to pass legislation on their own if Democrats unanimously oppose it.

The process, called reconciliation, was used by Republicans to pass tax cuts in 2017. Democrats used it twice under Biden, passing a sweeping COVID relief plan in 2021 and then passing a massive climate and health care package in 2022.

House Republican leaders argue they can get more of Trump’s priorities passed if they are rolled into one bill. Republican senators say they are fine with that approach in theory, but have some doubts the approach will work. The Republicans have the barest of majorities in the House and have repeatedly struggled to unify behind legislation.

In the last Congress, House Republicans were so divided that eight GOP members voted with Democrats to oust House Speaker Kevin McCarthy, an unprecedented action.

“Again, appreciate what the House is trying to do, but they’re kind of spinning the wheels right now and we can’t afford to spin

our wheels. We need to get the president the funding he needs to secure this border,” said Sen. Ron Johnson, R-Wis. “We’ve waited for a month. We can’t wait any longer.”

Trump has expressed a preference for Republicans to pass what he calls “one big beautiful bill.” But Graham said that the White House sending Vought and Homan to meet with senators is also a telling sign.

“I bet you they talked to (Trump) before they came over,” Graham told reporters. “... Why would they come over and tell us, begging for money, if they didn’t want to move?”

Graham said administration officials voiced chilling concerns during the briefing about the state of the U.S. border with Canada and Mexico, and Graham told reporters, “I’ve never been more worried about a terrorist attack on our homeland than I am now.”

“To the American people, if you’d like to finish the wall, we need more money to do it. If you want a more modern border, we need money to do it,” Graham said. “If you believe that President Trump is right to track down and deport criminal aliens and clean up the mess that’s been created over the last four years, we need more ICE agents.”

obviously you’re going to have to decrease your speed and increase your following distance.”

Officials are also reminding the public that due to the road

said “Now is the time to get it.”

“Most retailers probably, once they sell their products for this storm, they are probably not going to be buying it anymore,” Eagleburger said. “Spring goods are coming in, buy now, buy ahead.”

Eagleburger said the last big storm was too deep for sleds and not too many sleds were sold. This upcoming storm is a bit more reasonable and the St. Joseph School District is already out of school on

Wednesday for a teacher work day, which could incentivize more sled purchases.

“School is out on Wednesday and if we get snow, kids are going to be looking for something to do,” Eagleburger said.

Temperatures are projected to be well below freezing during the snowfall and Lamar said to be advised of slippery conditions.

“With the cold weather obviously that is going to be impactful,” Lamar said. “Things are going to freeze up that much quicker, things that wouldn’t normally be frozen will be. Take this one seriously too.”

expenses such as Kansas City Chiefs tickets, food, gas and retail purchases, according to a court document filed in the case.

Moon used his access to the district’s bank accounts to embezzle about \$92,747, according to a court document outlining the guilty plea.

A third allegation against him states Moon sponsored a Simple IRA Plan through Parker & Associates, which is subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act and caused about \$21,000 to be withheld from the salaries of his employees between January 2022 to December 2023, according to the court document. Moon also was required to make an employer-matching

contribution of more than \$8,600 but did not deposit the funds, according to court documents.

The first count of theft from a program receiving federal funds carries a maximum of 10 years in jail, a \$250,000 fine, three years of supervised release and an order of restitution.

Count two of wire fraud carries a maximum of 20 years in jail, a \$250,000 fine, three years of supervised release and an order of restitution.

Count three of theft from an employee benefit plan carries a maximum of five years in jail with identical penalties to counts one and two.

Moon is awaiting a judge’s decision on the penalties he’ll face pending the results of a pre-sentencing investigation.

The Savannah School District declined to provide a statement on the case.

Jordan's king opposes Gaza displacement after Trump meeting

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump hosted Jordan's King Abdullah II at the White House on Tuesday and renewed his insistence that Gaza could somehow be emptied of all residents, controlled by the U.S. and redeveloped as a tourist area.

It's an audacious, but highly unlikely, scheme to dramatically remake the Middle East and would require Jordan and other Arab nations to accept more Gazans — something Abdullah reiterated after their meeting that he opposes.

The pair met in the Oval Office with Secretary of State Marco Rubio also on hand. The president suggested he wouldn't withhold U.S. aid to Jordan or Egypt if they don't agree to dramatically increase the number of people from Gaza they take in.

"I don't have to threaten that. I do believe we're above that," Trump said. That contradicted the Republican president's previous suggestion that

holding back aid from Washington was a possibility.

Abdullah was asked repeatedly about Trump's plan to clear out Gaza and overhaul it as a resort on the Mediterranean Sea. He didn't make substantive

comments on it and didn't commit to the idea that his country could accept large numbers of Gazans.

He did say, however, that Jordan would be willing "right away" to take as many as 2,000 children in Gaza who are suffering from

cancer or otherwise ill.

"I finally see somebody that can take us across the finish line to bring stability, peace and prosperity to all of us in the region," the king said of Trump in his statement at the top of the meeting.

Abdullah left the White House after about two hours and headed to Capitol Hill to meet with a bipartisan group of lawmakers. He posted on X that during his meeting with Trump, "I reiterated Jordan's steadfast position against the displacement of Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank."

"This is the unified Arab position. Rebuilding Gaza without displacing the Palestinians and addressing the dire humanitarian situation should be the priority for all," Abdullah wrote.

That was despite Trump using his appearance with Abdullah to repeat suggestions that the U.S. could come to control Gaza. Trump also said Tuesday that it wouldn't require committing American funds but that the U.S. overseeing the war-torn region would be possible, "Under the U.S. authority," without elaborating what that actually was.

"We're not going to buy anything. We're going to

have it," Trump said of U.S. control in Gaza. He suggested that the redeveloped area could have new hotels, office buildings and houses, "and we'll make it exciting."

"I can tell you about real estate. They're going to be in love with it," Trump, who built a New York real estate empire that catapulted him to fame, said of Gaza's residents, while also insisting that he personally would not be involved in development.

Trump has previously suggested that Gaza's residents could be displaced temporarily or permanently, an idea that leaders around the Arab world have sharply rebuked.

Additionally, Trump renewed his suggestions that a tenuous ceasefire between Hamas and Israel could be canceled if Hamas doesn't release all of the remaining hostages it is holding by midday on Saturday. Trump first made that suggestion on Monday, though he insisted then that the ultimate decision lies with Israel.

Judge leaves intact a ban on DOGE access to Treasury records

NEW YORK | A federal judge on Tuesday made some tweaks but left intact a ban for now that prevents Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency from accessing Treasury Department records containing sensitive personal data for millions of Americans.

Judge Jeannette A. Vargas in Manhattan issued an order to continue a ban prior to a hearing Friday. The ban was put in place last week by another federal New York jurist in response to a lawsuit that 19 Democratic attorneys general brought against President Donald Trump.

Justice Department attorneys told Vargas in a filing on Sunday that the ban was unconstitutional and needed to be immediately reversed.

Coca-Cola reverses sales volume slide, up 6% in the fourth quarter

Coca-Cola said Tuesday it's confident it can mitigate the Trump administration's tariffs on aluminum by shifting its suppliers, relying more heavily on plastic bottles and other tools.

"It's not insignificant, but it's not going to radically change a multibillion-dollar U.S. business," Coke Chairman and CEO James Quincey said in a conference call with investors.

"It's a cost. It'll have to be managed. It would be better not to have it relative to the U.S. business, but we are going to manage our way through."

President Donald Trump hiked his 10% tariff on aluminum imports to 25% on Monday.

WASHINGTON | The U.S., U.K. and Australia on Tuesday sanctioned a Russian web-hosting services provider and two Russian men who administer the service in support of Russian ransomware syndicate LockBit.

The Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control and its U.K. and Australian counterparts sanctioned Zservers, a Russia-based bulletproof hosting services provider — which is a web-hosting service that ignores or evades law enforcement requests — and two Russian nationals serving as Zservers operators.

Trump steel, aluminum tariffs likely to drive up car costs

DETROIT — President Donald Trump's tariffs on steel imports this week could wreak havoc on American auto manufacturing, industry leaders say. The moves align with the Trump administration's aggressive global trade agenda and ambitions to strengthen U.S. industry, but they could have an inverse effect.

On March 12, all steel imports will be taxed at a minimum of 25%, the result of two orders the president signed Monday that also include a 25% tariff on aluminum. That could have a serious impact on domestic auto companies including Ford, GM and Stellantis — and make these companies' vehicles more expensive for the nation's car buyers.

Tariffs on crucial products coming from outside of the U.S. places pressure on domestic sourcing of the materials, experts say. The basic rules of supply and demand could drive up costs.

"Steel producers have to find ways to increase capacity, and aluminum and steel might be in short supply in the short term," said Sam Fiorani, analyst at AutoForecast Solutions, which studies the industry. "Producing vehicles has a lot of moving parts, and raising the price of what is among the most important components of the vehicle is only going to raise the price of an already expensive product."

The average transaction price for a new vehicle in the U.S. in January was \$48,641, according to auto-buying resource Kelley Blue Book — a hefty investment for an

inflation-sensitive consumer.

"Tariffs such as these do nothing to enhance the automotive industry directly," Fiorani said.

To Ford CEO Jim Farley, Trump's early actions in office — which also include 25% tariffs on goods coming from Mexico and Canada, although delayed by a month — are already challenging the Dearborn, Michigan, automaker.

The Trump administration has also upended electric vehicle policy put in place under former President Joe Biden, targeted EV charging infrastructure, as well as directed review of vehicle emissions and fuel economy rules — all of which could play a role in automaker plans to decarbonize. Already, auto companies have pulled back some electrification plans

Lawsuit: Trump administration owes U.S. business millions

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration's dismantling of the U.S. Agency for International Development is stifling American businesses on hundreds of millions of dollars in unpaid bills for work that has already been done, according to a lawsuit filed Tuesday.

The administration's abrupt freeze on foreign aid also is forcing mass layoffs by U.S. suppliers and contractors for USAID, including 750 furloughs at one company, Washington-based Chemonics International, the lawsuit says.

"One cannot overstate the impact of that unlawful course of conduct: on businesses large and small forced to shut down their programs and let employees go; on hungry children across the globe who will go without; on populations around the world facing deadly disease; and on our constitutional order," the U.S. businesses and organizations said.

An organization representing 170 small U.S. businesses, major suppliers, an American Jewish group aiding displaced people abroad, the American Bar Association

and others joined the court challenge.

It was filed in U.S. District Court in Washington against President Donald Trump, Secretary of State Marco Rubio, acting USAID Deputy Administrator Peter Marocco, a Trump appointee who has been a central figure in hollowing out the agency, and Russell Vought, Trump's head of the Office of Management and Budget.

It is at least the third lawsuit over the administration's rapid unraveling of the U.S. aid and development agency and its programs worldwide. Trump and ally Elon Musk have targeted USAID in particular, saying its work is out of line with Trump's agenda.

Marocco, Musk and Rubio have overseen an across-the-board freeze on foreign assistance and agency shutdown under a Jan. 20 executive order by Trump. A lawsuit brought by federal employees associations has temporarily blocked the administration from pulling thousands of USAID staffers off the job. The funding freeze and other measures have persisted, including the agency losing the lease on its Washington headquarters.

Wall Street holds firm despite latest tariffs

NEW YORK — Wall Street held relatively firm on Tuesday following President Donald Trump's latest tariff escalation and after the Federal Reserve hinted interest rates may not change for a while.

The S&P 500 was virtually unchanged and edged up by less than 0.1% in the market's first trading since Trump announced 25% tariffs on all foreign steel and aluminum coming into the country. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 123 points, or 0.3%, and the Nasdaq composite slipped 0.4%.

The moves were modest not only for U.S. stocks but also in the bond market, where Treasury yields rose by only a bit.

The threat of a possible trade war is very real, of course, with high potential stakes. Most of Wall Street agrees that substantial and sustained tariffs would push up prices for U.S. households and ultimately lead to big pain for financial markets around the world. The European Union's chief, Ursula von der Leyen, said on Tuesday that "unjustified tariffs on the EU will not go unanswered — they will trigger firm and proportionate countermeasures."

Grocers to limit purchase of eggs

Not only are eggs expensive because of the ongoing bird flu outbreak. Now they are getting hard to find. And when stores do have eggs, consumers are starting to face limits on how many they can buy.

Eggs have become such a hot commodity that there have even been a couple of heists where thieves seem to be treating the yolks as if they were made out of gold.

The problem isn't going away because the virus continues to mutate and infect more birds, other animals and some people. And anytime a chicken or turkey gets sick, the entire flock is slaughtered to help limit the spread.

The shortages tend to be isolated, so they might not be a problem at your store. But there's no way to predict when a massive farm with millions of birds might get hit, and just one of those cases can cause supply problems.

As a result, prices have skyrocketed.

Jose Castillo said it's becoming hard to keep the Cuban sandwiches and king cakes affordable at his Norma's Sweets Bakery in New Orleans because he's paying nearly four times as much for eggs now.

"Oh it's hurting man. It's crazy how expensive eggs are," said Castillo who is one of the bakery's co-owners. "Normally we'll get them for \$35, \$40 dollars a case and now we're paying like \$118, \$120 dollars."

Hard to find

Empty egg shelves are becoming more common across the country. Sometimes shoppers have to check two or three stores or seek out a local farmer to get their eggs.

This outbreak has taken a tremendous toll on poultry since it began in 2022. Nearly 158 million birds have been slaughtered overall with the majority being egg-laying chickens.

That hurts egg supplies and drives prices higher. But with more than 300 million chickens nationwide laying eggs for breakfast and baking, the industry can usually deal with the loss of a few million birds without many disruptions.

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Russia releases imprisoned American teacher Marc Fogel

WASHINGTON — Marc Fogel, an American teacher who was deemed wrongfully detained by Russia, has been released in what the White House described as a diplomatic thaw that could advance negotiations to end the war in Ukraine.

Steve Witkoff, a special envoy for President Donald Trump, left Russian airspace with Fogel, a history teacher from Pennsylvania, and he's expected to be reunited with his family by the end of the day.

Fogel was arrested in August 2021 and was serving a 14-year prison sentence. His family and supporters said he had been traveling with medically prescribed marijuana, and he was designated by President Joe Biden's administration as wrongfully detained in December. Michael Waltz, Trump's

national security adviser, said the U.S. and Russia "negotiated an exchange" to ensure Fogel's release. He did not say what the

U.S. side of the bargain entailed. Previous negotiations have occasionally involved reciprocal releases of Russians by the U.S. or

its allies.

Waltz said the development was "a sign we are moving in the right direction to end the brutal and

terrible war in Ukraine." Trump, a Republican, has promised to find a way to end the conflict.

Trump also has talked about having a good relationship with Russian President Vladimir Putin, who launched a full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022. Last month, Trump said his administration was having "very serious" conversations with Russia about the war.

Speaking to reporters at the White House on Tuesday, Trump said, "We were treated very nicely by Russia, actually. I hope that's the beginning of a relationship where we can end that war."

Asked whether the U.S. had given up anything in return, Trump replied "not much" but did not elaborate.

Fogel's relatives said they were "beyond grateful, relieved and overwhelmed" that he was

coming home.

"This has been the darkest and most painful period of our lives, but today, we begin to heal," they said. "For the first time in years, our family can look forward to the future with hope."

There was no immediate comment from Moscow about Fogel's release on Tuesday.

The U.S., Russia and other nations carried out a large prisoner swap in August that resulted in the release of Wall Street Journal reporter Evan Gershkovich and American corporate security executive Paul Whelan, among others.

But that deal left out numerous other Americans jailed in Russia, including Fogel. Some omitted then were also not included in Tuesday's release, including several who have had major milestones in their cases since then.

Trump administration appeals ruling blocking birthright citizenship order

President Donald Trump's administration on Tuesday said it's appealing a Maryland federal judge's ruling blocking the president's executive order seeking to end birthright citizenship for people whose parents are not legally in the country.

In a brief filing, the administration's attorneys said they were appealing to the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals. It's the second such appeal the administration has sought since Trump's executive order was blocked in court.

The government's appeal stems from U.S. District Judge Deborah Boardman's

grant of a preliminary injunction last week in a case brought by immigrant rights groups and expectant mothers in Maryland. Boardman said at the time her court would not become the first in the country to endorse the president's order, calling citizenship a "precious right" granted by the Constitution's 14th Amendment.

Tuesday's appeal is the latest volley over the president's birthright citizenship order, which has generated at least nine lawsuits nationwide, including suits brought by 22 states.

On Monday, a federal judge in New Hampshire in a similar lawsuit said from the bench that he wasn't convinced by the

administration's arguments and issued a preliminary injunction. It applies to the plaintiffs, immigrant rights groups with members who are pregnant, and others within the court's jurisdiction.

And last week, a Seattle-based federal judge ordered a block of the president's order, which the administration

also appealed.

The lawsuits in the three cases revolve around the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, ratified in 1868 after the Civil War and the Dred Scott Supreme Court decision, which held that Scott, an enslaved man, wasn't a citizen despite having lived in a state where slavery was outlawed.

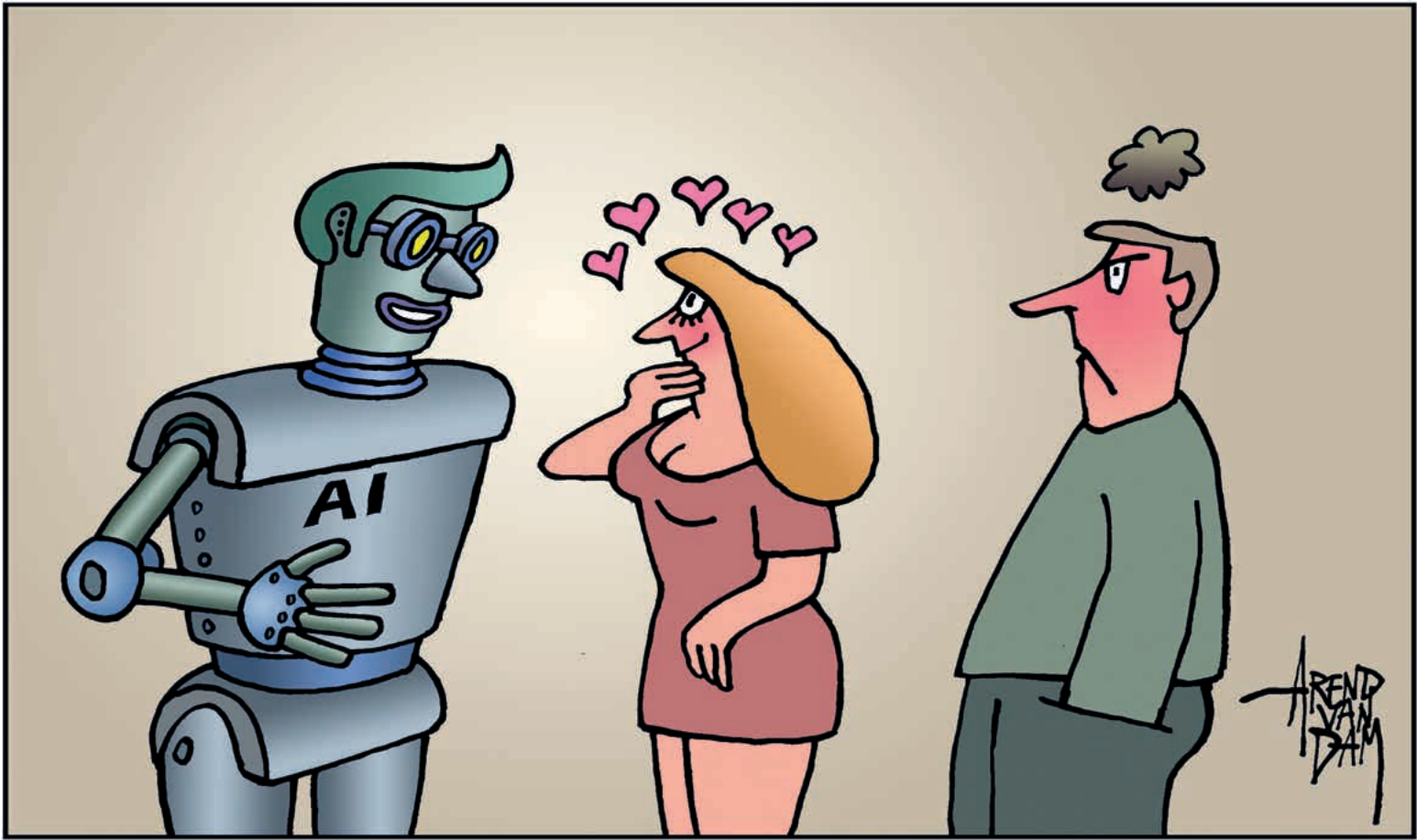

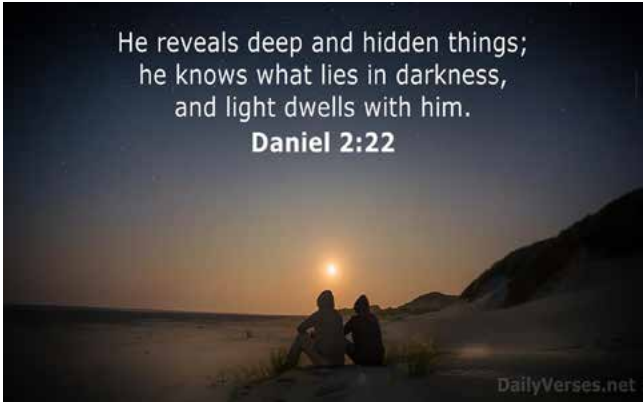

New research shows rural Americans don't live as long as those in cities

Rural Americans – particularly men – are expected to live significantly shorter, less healthy lives than their urban counterparts, according to our research, recently published in the Journal of Rural Health.

We found that a 60-year-old man living in a rural area is expected on average to live two fewer years than an urban man. For women, the rural-urban gap is six months.

A key reason is worse rates among rural people for smoking, obesity and chronic conditions such as high blood pressure and heart disease. These conditions are condemning millions to disability and shortened lives.

What's more, these same people live in areas where medical care is evaporating. Living in rural areas, with their relatively sparse populations, often means a shortage of doctors, longer travel distances for medical care and inadequate investments in public health, driven partly by declines in economic opportunities.

Our team arrived at these findings by using a simulation called the Future Elderly Model. With that, we were able to simulate the future life course of Ameri-

cans currently age 60 living in either an urban or rural area.

The model is based on relationships observed in 20 years of data from the Health and Retirement Study, an ongoing survey that follows people from age 51 through the rest of their lives. Specifically, the model showed how long these Americans might live, the expected quality of their future years, and how certain changes in lifestyle would affect the results.

We describe the conditions that drive our results as “diseases of despair,” building off the landmark work of pioneer-

ing researchers who coined the now widely used term “deaths of despair.” They documented rising mortality among Americans without a college degree and related these deaths to declines in social and economic prospects.

The main causes of deaths of despair – drug overdoses, liver disease and suicide – have also been called “diseases of despair.” But the conditions we study, such as heart disease, could similarly be influenced by social and economic prospects. And they can profoundly reduce quality of life.

We also found that if rural edu-

cation levels were as high as in urban areas, this would eliminate almost half of the rural-urban life-expectancy gap. Our data shows 65% of urban 60-year-olds were educated beyond high school, compared with 53% of rural residents the same age.

One possible reason for the difference is that getting a bachelor's degree may make a person more able or willing to follow scientific recommendations – and more likely to work out for 150 minutes a week or eat their veggies as their doctor advises them to.

Why it matters

The gap between urban and rural health outcomes has widened over recent decades. Yet the problem goes beyond disparities between urban and rural health: It also splits down some of the party lines and social divides that separate U.S. citizens, such as education and lifestyle.

Scholarship on the decline of rural America suggests that people living outside larger cities are resentful of the economic forces that may have eroded their economic power. The interplay between these forces and the health conditions we study are less appreciated.

DID YOU KNOW?

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The National Center for Statistics and Analysis says there were approximately 16,200 automotive accidents per day in the United States in 2022, the most recent year for data. This number has steadily risen over the last decade and may be attributable to a number of factors, including increased vehicle usage. February marks Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, calling attention to physical, sexual and emotional abuse within youth relationships.



Digital abuse is also a common form of teen dating violence.

According to a Centers for Disease Control study from 2021, one in 12 teenagers in relationships reported experiencing

physical dating violence. One in 10 said they were victims of sexual dating violence.

Zach Ellis, the youth program manager at the YWCA in St. Joseph, said it's important to help teens as they navigate difficult situations like this.

"It is a very real thing, and I think that kind of like a lot of things that have to do with teenagers, we like to chalk a lot of things up to puberty and, and a lot of emo-

tions and things," Ellis said. "But, in reality, it's just that they need to be taught how to handle those emotions and how to handle red flag situations."

Ellis says that although it may be a difficult conversation, it is important to talk to teens about dating violence.

"It's a less than ideal topic to discuss with your children, but in reality, statistics show

Bayer backs broadened effort to shield popular weedkiller from claims it failed to warn of cancer

DES MOINES, Iowa — A renewed and expanded effort from chemical giant Bayer to shield itself from lawsuits that claim its popular weed-killer Roundup causes cancer brought dozens of protesters to the Iowa Capitol building Monday begging lawmakers to reject it.

The legislation, pending in Iowa and at least seven other states, would protect pesticide companies from claims they failed to warn that their product causes cancer if the product label otherwise complies with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's regulations.

Similar efforts failed this year, Bayer and a coalition of agricultural groups are doubling down. A broader media

campaign is highlighting the importance of glyphosate-based Roundup for American agriculture. And they are getting help from a group that ran a Super Bowl ad in Missouri asserting the legislation is necessary to combat Chinese influence over the U.S. food supply.

Opponents, including those who rallied Monday in Des Moines, say the bills would limit the rights of people to hold companies accountable if their products cause harm. Speakers took turns telling stories of family members throughout the state who have been diagnosed with cancers and shouted out to lawmakers

that Iowa's people are more important than corporate profits.

"I feel like we need accountability here in Iowa," said Nick Schutt, a part-time farmer whose mother, father, aunt and two siblings have all had cancer diagnoses. "At the end of the day, multinational chemical companies like Bayer should be held accountable."

Bayer disputes the claims that Roundup causes cancer, but the company has been hit with about 177,000 lawsuits involving the weed-killer and has set aside \$16 billion to settle cases. It contends those legal

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Kansas governor vetoes a GOP-backed ban on gender-affirming care for trans minors

TOPEKA, Kan. — Kansas’ Democratic governor on Tuesday vetoed a proposed Republican-backed ban on gender-affirming care for transgender minors.

The GOP-controlled Legislature’s members had expected Gov. Laura Kelly’s action because she vetoed two similar bills previously. This year’s measure not only would ban gender-affirming surgeries, hormone treatments and puberty blockers for minors but also prohibit state employees caring for children from promoting social transitioning for them.

At least 26 other states

have restricted gender-affirming care for minors.

Votes last month suggested that backers of a Kansas ban have the

legislative supermajorities needed to override Kelly’s veto. House Minority Leader Brandon Woodard, a Kansas City-area Democrat,

acknowledged as much during a recent news conference and said opponents will ask state courts to overturn a ban.

Supporters argue that a ban would protect vulnerable children from what they’ve often described as a radical ideology about gender.

Transgender youth and their parents have said such care often lessens depression and suicidal tendencies.

Kelly chastised lawmakers in her veto message for what she said was their attempt to interfere with parental rights and in medical decisions.

costs are “not sustainable” and is looking for relief from lawmakers concerned about the possibility that Roundup could be pulled from the U.S. market.

For crops including corn, soybeans and cotton, Roundup is designed to work with genetically modified seeds that resist the weedkiller’s deadly effect. It allows farmers to produce more crops while conserving the soil by tilling it less.

“It is the most important product in global agriculture,” Liza Lockwood, Bayer’s medical affairs lead in its crop science division, said during a recent Missouri Senate committee hearing.

Some farmers have echoed that assertion. If lawsuits force Roundup off the U.S. market, they contend that Chinese-made products may be the only alternative.

“Losing access to this one safe and effective tool will set off a domino effect that will threaten family farmers and our state’s economy,” Kevin Ross, a farmer from southwest Iowa, said to Iowa lawmakers. Ross detailed how, for 50 years, the American-made product has increased soil quality, decreased water runoff and helped struggling farmers turn a profit.

An expanded field for legislation

Last year, Bayer focused its lobbying efforts on Missouri, Iowa and Idaho — home, respectively, to its North America crop science division, a Roundup manufacturing facility and the phosphate mines from which its key ingredient is derived. Though bills passed at least one chamber in Iowa and Missouri, they ultimately failed in all three states.

This year, legislation providing legal protection against failure-to-

warn claims already has passed the North Dakota House without any opposition. Similar bills have cleared initial committees in Iowa, Mississippi and Missouri and are pending in legislative committees in Florida, Oklahoma and Tennessee. A bill failed to get out of a Wyoming committee by a deadline.

Bayer officials said Monday that legislative efforts also are in the works in Georgia, Idaho and the U.S. Congress. A promotional campaign from the Modern Ag Alliance, a coalition that Bayer supports, has targeted an even wider array of states.

New to the cause this year is the Protecting America Initiative, an organization concerned about China’s influence on the U.S. economy and tied to Richard Grenell, President Donald Trump’s envoy for special missions and former acting director of national

intelligence. The group ran a television ad Sunday in central Missouri during the Super Bowl urging support for the legislation. It said it has invested six figures to run the 30-second spot more broadly across Missouri and Iowa.

It also parked a truck containing a portable billboard outside the Iowa Capitol on Monday, encouraging support of the bill to stop Chinese-made chemicals from “infiltrating American farms.”

Concerns about cancer and pesticides

Ads supporting legislation that could limit Bayer’s legal liability have emphasized the importance of its weed-control products to agriculture.

“Farming’s hard,” one Facebook advertisement says. “But it’s a little easier with glyphosate.”

That ad offended Kim Hagemann, a suburban Des Moines resident who

showed up to a crowded subcommittee meeting to share her opposition with lawmakers.

“Bayer is right, farming’s hard, but dealing with cancer is even harder,” said Hagemann, a member of one of the groups that organized Monday’s protest.

Though some studies associate Roundup’s key ingredient glyphosate with cancer, the EPA has said it is not likely to be carcinogenic to humans when used as directed. Yet the numerous lawsuits against Bayer allege glyphosate does cause a cancer called non-Hodgkin lymphoma.

One of the many attorneys involved in the lawsuits against Bayer is Robert F. Kennedy Jr., Trump’s nominee to serve as secretary of Health and Human Services. Though the health agency oversees the Food and Drug Administration, it does

not control the EPA and its labeling requirements.

The legislation supported by Bayer would provide a defense against failure-to-warn claims not only for Roundup but for other pesticide products that follow EPA labeling guidelines.

Richard Deming, a cancer physician in Des Moines, said it often takes decades to determine a cause-and-effect connection between cancer and long-term exposure to low levels of chemicals. He said public policy should focus on mitigating that risk, not providing “immunity from responsibility.”

“I don’t think that ag chemicals causes as much cancer as cigarette smoking,” Deming told the AP after speaking to lawmakers. But studies suggest “there’s clear association between ag chemical exposure in the state of Iowa and cancer incidence.”

Four financial tasks you shouldn't put off

You’ve probably got one or two financial jobs on your to-do list that you were too busy to get to or perceived as boring administrative work. Here are some tasks that a) frequently fall by the wayside and b) don’t take a lot of time to rectify.

Pain point 1: Contributing to an IRA
For higher-income savers with good-quality 401(k) plans, it’s easy to see why putting additional funds into an IRA might not seem like a must-do. But making \$7,000 annual contributions for 30 years and earning a 6% return would translate into an additional \$550,000 in retirement.
Tips to get it done: To make hitting IRA contributions more doable and palatable from a budgetary standpoint, put them on autopilot, instructing your investment provider to deduct whatever amount you can swing from your checking account on a monthly basis.

Pain point 2: Converting ‘backdoor’ contributions to Roth
If the conversion is done shortly after the contribution, the investments won’t likely rack up much gains in the interim, and any taxes on conversion are also apt to be limited. But if too much time elapses and you invested in something that has enjoyed nice gains since you bought it, you’ll owe ordinary income tax on that appreciation when you finally get around to converting.
Tips to get it done: It’s wise to wait at least a few days after the contribution to make a conversion. To make sure you don’t forget, schedule the conversion date on your calendar at the same time you make the contribution.
Pain point 3: Investing health savings account assets
As a long-term savings vehicle, health savings accounts are hard to beat because they offer a trifecta of tax benefits: tax-free

contributions, tax-free compounding, and tax-free withdrawals for qualified healthcare expenses.
But inertia is no doubt a stumbling block for some HSA contributors, too, as the process for getting the funds invested can be cumbersome.
Tips to get it done: The name of the game is to invest your HSA in line with how you’re using it. If you’re tapping it for ongoing healthcare expenses and/or you need to maintain a minimum balance in the savings account, it’s wise to maintain a balance in the savings option even as you’re directing additional assets to the investment option.
Pain point 4: Keeping beneficiary designations up to date
Beneficiary designations are one of the most important aspects of an estate plan, in that they typically supersede what’s stated elsewhere in the plan.

Salman Rushdie testifies about his shock and pain as a stranger repeatedly stabbed him on stage

MAYVILLE, N.Y. | Salman Rushdie described in graphic detail Tuesday the frenzied moments in 2022 when a masked man rushed at him on a stage in western New York and repeatedly slashed him with a knife, leaving him with terrible injuries and fearful he would die.
Rushdie took the stand during the second day of testimony at the trial of **Hadi Matar**, 27, who has pleaded not guilty to attempted murder and assault in the attack that also wounded another man. It was the first time since the stabbing that the 77-year-old author was in the same room as the man accused of trying to kill him.
Rushdie recalled feeling “a sense of great pain and shock, and aware of the fact that there was an enormous quantity of blood that I was lying in” after the attack at the Chautauqua Institution — the nonprofit art and education center about 75 miles south of Buffalo where he was supposed to present a lecture that day.

“It occurred to me that I was dying. That was my predominant thought,” he said, adding that the people who subdued his assailant likely saved his life.
ASAP Rocky decides not to take the stand at his felony assault trial
LOS ANGELES | ASAP Rocky will not take the stand at his trial over two felony counts of assault with a semiautomatic firearm and the defense rested its case Tuesday without calling him to testify.
The 36-year-old hip-hop star said “Absolutely, your honor” when asked by Superior Court Judge **Mark Arnold** if he had discussed the issue with his lawyers, and said he would invoke his Fifth Amendment right to silence.
“I want my right to not testify,” Rocky said.
He left the courthouse a few hours later, after jurors received instructions from the judge. Closing arguments at the three-week trial will be Thursday morning, and jurors could begin deliberating by that afternoon.
Rocky’s attorney **Joe Tacopina** had said late Monday that either his client would take the stand

Tuesday or the defense would rest its case, and an attorney for the prosecution said his team would prepare for Rocky’s possible testimony.

Super Bowl averaged a record 127.7 million U.S. viewers

Despite the game being a blowout, Sunday night’s Super Bowl averaged a record 127.7 million U.S. viewers across television and streaming platforms for Philadelphia’s 40-22 victory over Kansas City.
The game was televised by Fox, Fox Deportes and Telemundo and streamed on Tubi as well as the NFL’s digital platforms.
Not only is it a 3% increase from last year, it is the second straight year the Super Bowl has reached a record audience. The Chiefs’ 25-22 overtime victory over San Francisco in 2024 averaged 123.7 million on CBS, Nickelodeon, Univision and streaming platforms.
According to Nielsen, the audience peaked at 137.7 million in the second quarter (8-8:15 p.m. EST).
Some of the increase can be attributed to a change in the way viewers are counted. This is the first year Nielsen is measuring out-of-home viewers for all states but Hawaii and Alaska.

Decadent treats and Valentine's Day go hand in hand. Couples typically exchange gifts on Valentine's Day, and those gifts are often accompanied by something sweet. A 2017 survey from Statista found that 44 percent of respondents intended to purchase candy and sweets for their significant other on Valentine's Day. That made candy and sweets the most popular Valentine's Day gift by a considerable margin, well above the likes of other February 14th favorites like greeting cards (33 percent) and flowers (32 percent). Romantic dinners still have a place at the Valentine's Day table, as the Statista survey found that 29 percent of respondents intended to sit down for a romantic meal as part of their celebration. Homemade desserts can be a great way to show that special someone just how much they're loved. If cooks want to employ the

element of surprise, then this recipe for "Ginger Cake" from Will Budiaman's "The Essential Kamado Grill Cookbook" (Rockridge Press) won't disappoint. Firing up the grill is sure to pique a loved one's interest, and the slightly spicy finished product marks a departure from more traditional desserts.

Ginger Cake

Serves 8

› 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, cubed, plus more for the pan,

› at room temperature

› 2½ cups all-purpose flour

› 2½ teaspoons baking powder

› 4 teaspoons ground ginger

› 1 teaspoon kosher salt

› 1 2/3 cups packed light brown sugar

› 4 large eggs

› 1/2 cup whole milk

1. Bring the grill to 350 F with the cooking grate and heat deflector installed. Butter

the bottom and sides of a 10-inch cast iron skillet.

2. In a medium bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder, ginger, and salt.

3. In the bowl of an electric mixer, cream together the butter and sugar on medium speed for 3 minutes.

4. Reduce the speed to medium-low and add the eggs one at a time. Mix for 1 to 2 minutes or until light tan in color.

5. With the machine running, add the milk.

6. Add the flour mixture, scraping down the side of the bowl as needed, until fully incorporated. Transfer to the skillet.

7. Put the skillet on the grate. Close the lid and cook for 1 hour or until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean.

8. Put on a wire rack to cool completely before serving.

Cooking tip: Cutting butter into small cubes and arranging them in a single layer will help them soften more quickly.

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Behind the call: It's time to revalue running backs

It's time to revalue the devalued running back position in the NFL after Saquon Barkley's mere presence, if not his production, helped the Philadelphia Eagles dismantle the Kansas City Chiefs in one of the most lopsided Super Bowls ever.

Barkley capped a great year for free-agent running backs by hoisting the Lombardi Trophy after the Eagles' 40-22 dismantling of the Chiefs on Sunday that avenged a heart-breaking Super Bowl loss two years earlier and denied Patrick Mahomes & Co. an unprecedented third consecutive title and Pat Riley royal-

ties for all that three-peat merchandise now headed for the dump.

Barkley, who had seven total touchdown runs of 60 yards or more in his first season with the Eagles, gained a modest 57 yards on 25 carries Sunday, and he gave props to Steve Spagnuolo's defense for

McNealy learns hard lesson of winning late

SAN DIEGO — Winning still has plenty of perks on the PGA Tour, from a two-year exemption to invitations to the Masters and the PGA Championship.

But there's a difference between winning early and winning late.

Nick Taylor and Harris English failed to finish in the top 50 in the FedEx Cup last year, which is no longer a problem. By winning in Honolulu (Taylor) and San Diego (English), they are in the \$20 million signature events for the rest of the year.

Such was the case in 2024 for Matthieu Pavon (San Diego), Jake Knapp (Mexico) and Taylor (Phoenix).

And then there's Maverick McNealy. He won the season-ending RSM Classic at Sea Island. That got him into Kapalua — the first of eight signature events — as a PGA Tour winner. Having easily finished in the top 60, that assured him spots in the other two signature events on the West Coast swing.

But he's not yet in the next two, Bay Hill and Hilton Head.

"The weird thing about last year was that winning early in the year was way more valuable than winning late in the year," McNealy said. "Because you look

NASCAR drivers divided on new rule that could impact the Daytona 500

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — A controversial new NASCAR rule designed for "world-class drivers" could give Helio Castro-neves an automatic berth into the Daytona 500, and, should the four-time Indianapolis 500 winner use

the provisional, it would make for the largest field in a decade.

It's a complicated rule that was written into the charter agreement that 13 teams signed last September and is similar to a "promoters' provisional" in that it gives NASCAR the ability to designate

one driver as a guaranteed 41st entry.

Three-time Daytona 500 Denny Hamlin winner said the rule "reeks of desperation" by NASCAR, calling it nothing but a gimmick to attract big stars to stock car racing. Others wondered why the provisional went to Cas-

troneves, who at 49 will be making his NASCAR debut, instead of seven-time NASCAR champion Jimmie Johnson, a two-time Daytona 500 winner.

The rule is designed for drivers who don't currently race full time in NASCAR, so Johnson and 2017 Cup Series champion Mar-

tin Truex Jr. would have been eligible for consideration for the provisional.

But their teams never put in the request, which must be done 90 days before the event. Only Trackhouse Racing requested the provisional for Castro-neves, who enters Wednesday's qualifying as the

only driver eligible for the 41st spot.

"I think Jimmie Johnson is a world-class driver, but I guess other people don't," Alex Bowman said. "It's an interesting rule for sure. There's a lot of hype and importance to the

Eagles’ Kellen Moore will become the Saints head coach

NEW ORLEANS | Kellen Moore, who oversaw the Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles’ offense this season, has agreed to return to the site of his latest triumph as the next coach of the New Orleans Saints.

The 36-year-old Moore will join an organization that has been floundering since the retirement of quarterback Drew Brees and departure of Super Bowl-winning coach Sean Payton. The Saints haven’t made the playoffs since the 2020 season — the last of Brees’ career.

Their interest in Moore became increasingly evident as the club waited longer to fill its vacancy than any other NFL team seeking a new coach this year.

Moore was the only assistant coach on either Super Bowl team to be interviewed by New Orleans and thus the only candidate who, under league rules, could not be hired until after Sunday’s title game was played. The Saints announced their agreement with Moore on Tuesday.

Royals bring back former manager Ned Yost as a senior adviser

KANSAS CITY, MO. | The Royals have hired Ned Yost as a senior adviser to general manager J.J. Picollo, bringing back the manager who led them to back-to-back American League pennants and a World Series title in 2015.

The club announced the move Tuesday, one day before pitchers and catchers were scheduled to report to spring training.

“My deep love for the Royals, for Kansas City, and for the people there never left,” said the 69-year-old Yost, who retired after the 2019 season. “I just want to help, because I know I can help. I know what it takes to build a world championship club, and I think we’re getting close. I think we’re getting really close.”

The Royals, who lost 106 games just two years ago, went 86-76 last season, when Bobby Witt Jr. emerged as one of the bright young talents in the game and a rebuilt rotation produced a pair of All-Star pitchers. They wound up earning one of the AL wild cards and advanced to the divisional round, where they lost in four games to the New York Yankees.

Luka Doncic makes his Lakers debut in win over Jazz

LOS ANGELES | Luka Doncic was the last starter introduced by the Los Angeles Lakers, an honor normally reserved for LeBron James. When Doncic jogged into the spotlight on a darkened court through a cordon of his new teammates, his new fans stood and roared while wearing thousands of gold T-shirts with his name and number.

Even a young superstar could feel the magnificence of the moment.

“I was a little nervous before,” Doncic said. “I (don’t remember) the last time I was nervous before the game. But once I stepped on the court again, it was fun. Just being out there, it felt amazing.”

Doncic’s debut with the Lakers was brief and successful Monday night, but it piqued the anticipation of everybody involved for his days and years ahead in Los Angeles.

Donovan goes to arbitration with Cardinals

ST. PETERSBURG, FLA. | Brendan Donovan went to salary arbitration with the St. Louis Cardinals on Tuesday, asking for \$3.3 million rather than the team’s \$2.85 million offer.

A decision is expected Wednesday from arbitrators Jeanne Vonhof, Joshua Gordon and Stephen Raymond, when the decision from the Feb. 5 hearing involving outfielder Lars Nootbaar is expected to be announced.

Donovan, who turned 28 last month, hit .278 last year while setting career bests with 14 homers and 73 RBIs. He has a .280 average with 30 homers and 152 RBIs in three big league seasons, all with the Cardinals.

He was eligible for arbitration for the first time after having a \$757,200 salary last year.

Teams have won three of five decisions, defeating New York Yankees reliever Mark Leiter Jr. (\$2.05 million instead of \$2.5 million) and Pittsburgh pitchers Dennis Santana (\$1.4 million instead of \$2.1 million) and Johan Oviedo (\$850,000 instead of \$1.15 million).

slowing him down.

Barkley’s biggest contribution, however, was in forcing the Chiefs to load the box with extra defenders, which freed up the likes of DeVonta Smith, A.J. Brown and Jahan Dotson to make crucial catches as Jalen Hurts threw just five incompletions while accounting for nearly 300 yards of offense and three touchdowns.

John Elway was blown out in his first three trips to the Super Bowl before capping his Hall of Fame playing career with back-to-back titles once fellow Hall of Famer Terrell Davis joined him in the Denver Broncos’ backfield.

“A great running back is a quarterback’s best friend,” Elway said more than once when looking back on his Super Bowl successes.

Speaking of Davis, by half-time Barkley surpassed Davis’ all-time rushing yards record in a season of 2,476 while becoming the first player to top 2,500 yards, counting playoffs.

Mahomes, meanwhile, sure could have used a good ground game Sunday.

Behind a spongy offensive line that left him battered, Mahomes handed off just seven times and the Chiefs, who had won 23 of their previous 25 games, trailed 34-0 before they

ever crossed midfield.

Kareem Hunt gained 9 yards on three carries, Isiah Pacheco managed 7 yards on three carries and Samaje Perine reeled off an 8-yard gain on his only handoff.

Like Hurts, who led Philly with 72 yards on the ground, Mahomes was KC’s leading rusher, with 25 yards on four runs. The rest of the time, Mahomes was desperately trying to avoid the Eagles’ destructive four-man pass rush that sacked him six times, forced him into three turnovers and

was so consistently effective that coordinator Vic Fangio never once had to dial up a blitz to rattle him.

Barkley’s 2,504 total yards rushing and 18 touchdown runs capped a big comeback for NFL running backs in a season that began with so many veterans switching jerseys and helping propel their new teams toward the playoffs.

Derrick Henry left Tennessee for Baltimore and rushed for 1,921 yards and an NFL-best 16 touchdowns, and he

at Matthieu Pavon — wins the Farmers, third event of the season, he’s in all the signature events the rest of the year.”

McNealy also cited Jhonattan Vegas, who was having a rough time until winning the 3M Open in Minnesota in July. That barely got him into the postseason and Vegas lasted one playoff event. Vegas was at Kapalua as a tournament winner, and he barely got into Pebble Beach, which has an 80-man field (instead of 72) because of the amateurs.

“The timing of the win based on the way that was set up mattered a lot, which was an interesting consequence,” McNealy said.

That much is evident this week at the Genesis Invitational, which is missing six players who won tournaments that offered full FedEx Cup points last year — Vegas, Rafael Campos, Matt McCarty, Patton Kizzire, Peter Malnati and Davis Riley.

Malnati got into five signature events after his win at the Valpar Championship, so he had his chances. Riley won at Colonial in May, giving him access to only two signature events. The other six won after the signature events — excluding the PGA

Tour postseason — were done.

McNealy believes there is a solution, he’s just not sure what it is.

“I haven’t spent a ton of time thinking about it,” he said. “I’ve really just been trying to get my golf game in good shape.”

LA wildfire initiative

The Genesis Invitational had to relocate from Riviera to Torrey Pines because of the devastating wildfires in Los Angeles. The tournament is still all about LA.

Genesis, which has North American headquarters in Southern California, TGR Live and the PGA Tour have launched “California Rises” to drive relief and recovery efforts.

Genesis is donating \$8 million — \$7.5 million from 100 tournament vehicles, the rest cash contributions.

“Together with our partners at TGR Live and the PGA Tour, the focus of the 2025 Genesis Invitational will be helping those affected by the wildfires,” said Jose Munoz, president and global CEO of Genesis.

The Genesis vehicles used during the week at Torrey Pines will be donated to various organizations including the Salvation Army, Think Watts Foundation and the Los Angeles Fire Department Foundation. The groups will use the vehicles for relief and recovery, including supporting those who have lost their transportation.

Led by a group of veteran players who have state championship game experience, Benton would lean on starters like Andrea Simmons and Eliana Arambula to drive the car, but it was the players in the backseat of the car that ended up playing a huge part in the late-game surge.

Freshmen Jenna Cox and Klarabelle Turner would explode in the second half to put a metaphorical dagger in

the hearts of Lafayette fans. Turner’s explosion of the bench would stretch among the third and fourth quarters. Turner tallied three three pointers, whereas Cox would do her damage in the fourth quarter. Cox would also nail three triples in the final quarter, while also scoring a layup with 11 of 14 points coming in the fourth.

Benton’s victory over Lafayette on Tuesday and a win over Chillicothe last week puts them in the driver’s seat for the number one seed in the upcoming Class 4 District 16 tournament with just a handful of games left on the regular season schedule.

sport to have people like (Castroneves) that come in and, if they miss the race, it kind of hurts the whole thing.

“So I get it, but I also wish some of our past champions were respected in the same way in some sense.”

Castroneves will use the provisional only if he fails in traditional qualifying to claim one of the four open spots in what was supposed to be a 40-car field. If he uses it, the 41 cars will be the most in the Daytona 500 since 2015, when 43 cars was still standard.

Trackhouse and Castroneves also won’t receive any points or payouts if he’s the 41st driver, and all drivers who finish behind him will be moved up one position in the standings.

The rule has divided the field, even though it probably will come into play only at Daytona International Speedway, where nine drivers are vying for the four open spots. NASCAR’s charter sys-

tem guarantees entry to 36 cars every race.

“Aside from the Daytona 500, we don’t get in a spot very often where drivers of that caliber are going home,” Tyler Reddick said. “I don’t know where to fall on this. On one hand, I would hate for a guy like Lewis Hamilton to come over here and attempt to start the 500... (and) something keeps him from running the race. We also don’t just want to let them have a spot in the race — like, they have to earn it.”

What if Johnson and Truex had requested the provisional?

Logically, if multiple drivers had requested the provisional, the most sense would have been for it to go to the highest qualifier.

Nope.

If NASCAR does receive multiple requests, NASCAR will decide who the designated “world-class driver” is ahead of the event. The criteria listed in the charter for the rule states “the “Open Exemption” position is intended for a driver who will significantly impact the promotion of the event and grow the prominence of the sport.

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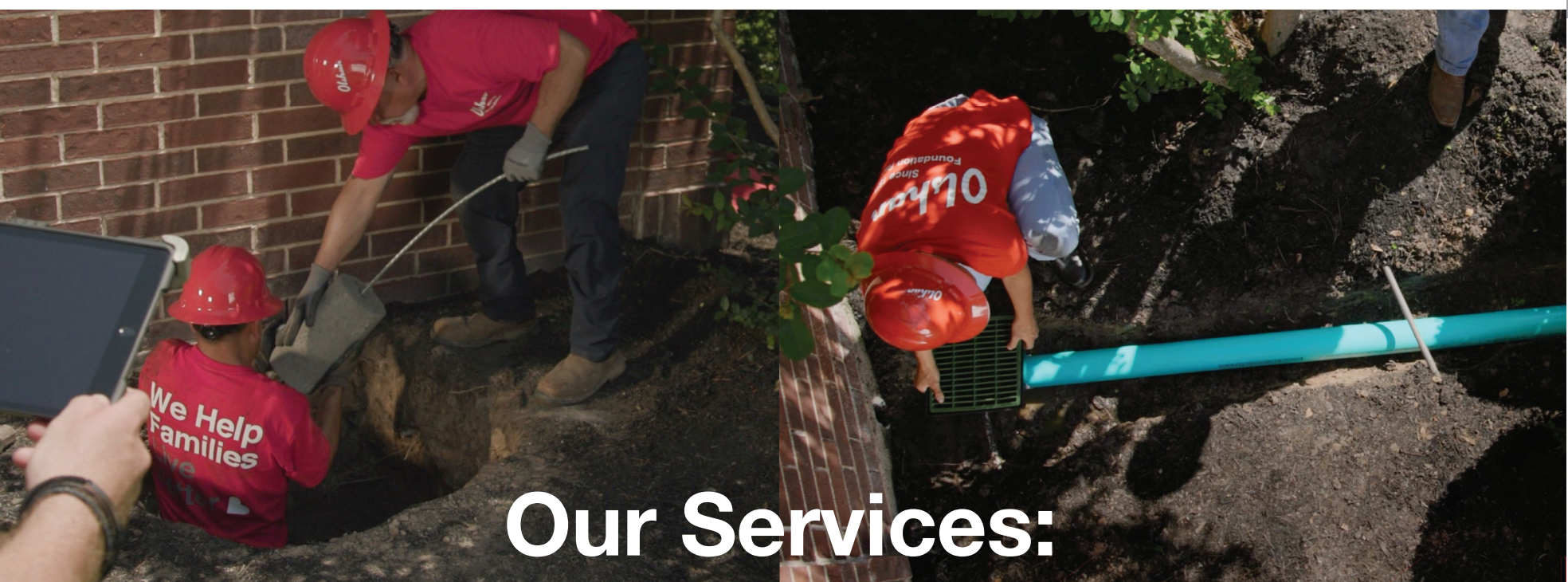

Inflation update

The Labor Department today issues its latest report on inflation at the consumer level.

Economists expect the consumer price index rose 2.9% last month, matching the year-over-year increase in December. The annual rate of inflation has mostly inched higher since October. That has raised warning flags for the Federal Reserve, which cut interest rates three times in 2024, but has signaled that it will proceed cautiously in 2025.



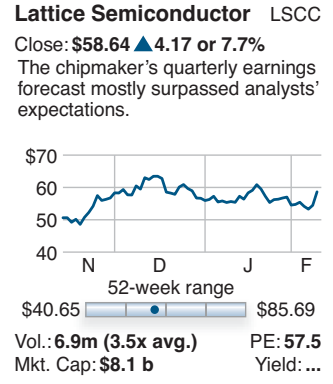
Fed watch

Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell offers up his second day of testimony to Congress today.

On Tuesday, Powell told a Senate committee that the Fed is prepared to keep its key interest rate unchanged for now as inflation remains elevated and the job market solid. Powell's appearance comes with inflation still above the Fed's 2% target and the Trump administration upending long-time U.S. policies by imposing tariffs while seeking to drastically cut government spending.

StoryStocks

U.S. stocks drifted to a mixed close following President Donald Trump's latest tariff escalation and after the Federal Reserve hinted interest rates may not change for a while. The S&P 500 ended flat Tuesday. The Dow rose 0.3%. The Nasdaq fell 0.4%.



Hearty spending

Love could conquer inflation this Valentine's Day. Consumers are expected to spend a record-breaking amount of money on candy, flowers and other items for Valentine's Day. The National Retail Federation expects \$27.5 billion in spending for the holiday, according to a survey. That would mark a solid increase from last year and break a record set in 2020. Candy purchases top the priority list in the survey, followed by flowers and greeting cards. The forecast comes amid continued pressure from inflation on a wide range of products. Prices for candy finished 2024 up 3.7%, according to

consumer price index data for December. That capped off a year of rising candy prices. Chocolate prices remain high because of low supplies amid crop failures in major cocoa producing regions such as West Africa. Prices for jewelry, a typical Valentine's gift, rose steadily through the last half of 2024. Eating out, a popular Valentine's Day activity, also became steadily more expensive throughout 2024. The solid spending forecast for Valentine's Day follows a strong year of consumer spending. Retail sales rose 2.6% in 2024. Strong consumer spending has been a key support for broader economic growth.

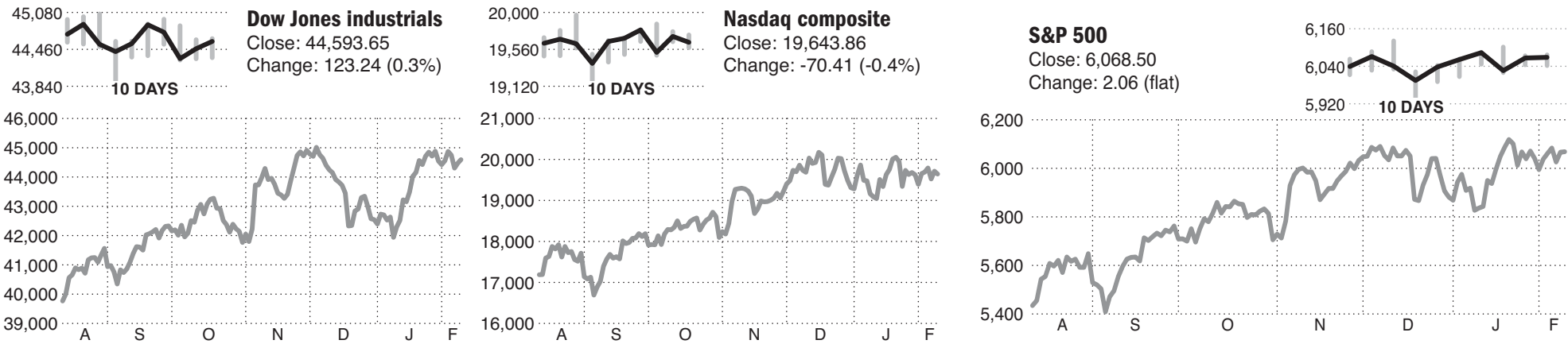

Company SpotlightCoke pops

Coca-Cola jumped to its biggest gain in three years on Tuesday as the beverage behemoth sold more products at higher prices. Revenue for the Atlanta beverage giant rose 6% to \$11.5 billion, better than the \$10.7 billion Wall Street was expecting. Net income, or profit, rose 11% to \$2.2 billion for the October-December period. Adjusted for one-time items, the company earned 55

cents per share. That also beat analysts' forecasts of 52 cents. Coke hiked prices 9% in the quarter, partly due to intense inflation in markets like Argentina. Prices also rose because Coke sold a higher mix of premium beverages like Fairlife milk and Topo Chico sparkling water. Coca-Cola Zero Sugar saw strong growth globally in the fourth quarter, with case volumes up 13%.
