I-229 project results in new disc golf course, Robidoux Landing reconstruction

Disc golf fans can look forward to the addition of a new course in the coming years along St. Joseph Avenue, the by-product of a much larger project looming with it.

The course will be located on a seven-acre plot of land off Northwest Parkway and just across the street from where the new Northside Splash Park, formerly Krug Pool, will open in the spring of 2026. The course is designed to be more of an entry-level amenity with nine holes

as opposed to the normal 18.

“It’s extremely popular,” Chuck Kempf, director of parks, recreation and civic facilities, said of the sport. “We aren’t

even completely done with the one at Hyde Park yet and people are already playing on it.”

St. Joseph has five courses spread throughout the city, including

ones at Bartlett Park and Southwest Parkway, Missouri Western and Hyde Park, also called Red Bird Hills. Three of the courses are built with 18 or more holes.

Since 2017, disc golf courses across the country have nearly doubled to about 15,000, making it one of the fastest-growing recreational activities.

The new course will have a relatively flat surface with fewer obstacles due to the terrain. A small trail will be constructed through the course.

Rescinded funding freeze still raises concerns for non-profits

While the initial threat of a funding freeze for nonprofits receiving federal aid has been rescinded, social service agencies in St. Joseph are keeping a cautious eye on the situation.

Local nonprofit leaders told News-Press NOW most people do not realize the important gap that federal funds fill alongside the generosity of individuals and businesses. Although the proposed freeze on federal grants by the Trump Administration did not apply to certain individual disbursements like SNAP or Medicare, AFL-CIO Executive Director Nichi Seckinger said other important individual needs would go unmet in the event of such a decision.

“A lot of transitional housing programs and a lot of our utility assistance programs are based on those federal dollars,” Seckinger said. “Even though those payments go through an agency, from the federal to the city level, those payments are being made on behalf of individuals in need of direct assistance.”

A freeze in federal funding for such needs would be devastating for individuals in need and put more pressure

The state’s Attorney General Andrew Bailey is asking residents to be wary of any “too-good-to-be-true”

ticket prices as scammers are targeting excited fans.

“With the Chiefs heading to the Super Bowl, I want all Missourians to stay sharp when purchasing their tickets and avoid falling victim to scams,” Bailey said in a news release.

USAID security leaders on leave after trying to keep Musk's DOGE from classified info, officials say

WASHINGTON | The Trump administration has placed two top security chiefs at the U.S. Agency for International Development on leave after they refused to turn over classified material in restricted areas to Elon Musk's government-inspection teams, a current and a former U.S. official told The Associated Press on Sunday.

Members of Musk's Department of Government Efficiency, known as DOGE, eventually did gain access Saturday to the aid agency's classified information, which includes intelligence reports, the former official said.

Musk's DOGE crew lacked high enough security clearance to access that information, so the two USAID security officials — John Voorhees and deputy Brian McGill — believed themselves legally obligated to deny access.

The current and former U.S. officials had knowledge of the incident and spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to share the information.

Musk on Sunday responded to an X post about the news by saying, "USAID is a criminal organization. Time for it to die." He followed with multiple additional posts on X about the aid agency.

Kate Miller, who serves on an advisory board for DOGE, said in a separate post that no classified material was accessed "without proper security clearances."

It comes a day after DOGE carried out a

similar operation at the Treasury Department, gaining access to sensitive information including the Social Security and Medicare customer payment systems. The Washington Post reported that a senior Treasury official had resigned over Musk's team accessing sensitive information.

Musk formed DOGE in cooperation with the Trump administration with the stated goal of finding ways to fire federal workers, cut programs and slash federal regulations.

USAID, whose website vanished Saturday without explanation, has been one of the federal agencies most targeted by the Trump administration in an escalating crackdown on the federal government and many of its programs.

"It's been run by a bunch of radical lunatics. And we're getting them out," Trump said to reporters about USAID on Sunday night.

FBI employees questioned about involvement in Jan. 6 cases as Justice Department weighs firings

WASHINGTON | Thousands of FBI employees who participated in investigations related to the Jan. 6, 2021, riot at the U.S. Capitol are being asked to complete in-depth questionnaires about their involvement in the inquiries as the Trump administration Justice Department weighs disciplinary actions that could result in firings.

The questions, which were described to The Associated Press by a person familiar with the matter, ask employees to describe their office and title and to specify their involvement in the Jan. 6 investigations, including whether they participated in search warrants, conducted interviews and testified at trial.

The survey is in keeping with an extraordinary Justice Department directive Friday for the names, titles and offices of all FBI employees who worked on investigations related to Jan. 6, when pro-Trump rioters who stormed the Capitol triggered a violent and bloody clash with law enforcement in a massive attempt to block the certification of election results.

A memo from acting Deputy Attorney General

Emil Bove, who defended Trump in his criminal cases before joining the administration, said Justice Department officials would then carry out a "review process to determine whether any additional personnel actions are necessary."

That's on top of the forced departures of more than a half-dozen senior FBI executives, the reassignment last month of several key career Justice Department officials, as well as the firings of roughly two dozen employees at the U.S. attorney's office in Washington who participated in the Jan. 6 investigations.

The scrutiny of career agents is highly unusual given that rank-and-file FBI agents do not select the cases they are assigned to work on, do not historically switch positions or receive any sort of discipline because of their participation in politically sensitive cases and especially because there's been no evidence any FBI agents or lawyers who investigated or prosecuted the cases engaged in misconduct.

on nonprofits that receive little or no federal funding to try and help partner agencies pick up the slack. For instance, even though the United Way of St. Joseph takes no federal funds, many of their partner agencies rely on it for key programs that range from the care of mothers and infants to keeping people in livable homes, United Way of St. Joseph's Executive Director Kylie Strough, said. "What we often don't recognize is that it's a braided kind of funding," Strough said. "It is a blend of private and public partnership ...

that helps these programs happen at the scale needed in our area." After the sudden issuance of the potential federal funding freeze, the pausing of it by the courts and then a notice from the Trump Administration of a rescinding of the order, many nonprofits are left to wonder how reliable future funding will be for their programs. The solutions to these concerns vary. According to Seckinger at AFL-CIO, many agencies are going to be more reluctant to spend federally funded dollars because they are not yet sure the money will be refunded to them. Strough at United Way said ongoing prioritization is more important now than ever, similar to the ap-

proach that all nonprofits were forced to take during the COVID-19 pandemic. "At that time, we had to focus on the most essential services and programs and make sure you are finding ways to keep those going," Strough said. This is the approach of Catholic Charities of Kansas City/St. Joseph, whose CEO Karen Noel issued a statement to News-Press NOW that said, in part, "Without knowing how long the 'pause' will be, we are working on a plan to utilize our operational reserves, which will last approximately 90 days." She went on to say that a restoration of the full flow of these federal funds will keep thousands of nonprofit organizations from bankruptcy.

through a trustworthy website. Businesses can be searched on the Better Business Bureau's website.

Using credit cards also offers more protection than other methods of payment such as a debit card or mobile payment app. A lock symbol should be displayed in the address bar next to the website's URL to indicate it is secure. The attorney general's of-

the Wendy's drive-up window in Lenexa, Kansas, and she walked right up to him when he was in the drive-thru," Brennan said. "(It was) right after their first preseason game, I think it was against Buffalo." Brennan's brother-in-law Randy Widener is the creator of the 22+2 group. Along with contributing to the Chiefs' themed room, he has also made custom shirts for each big game. "Very first game at Arrowhead that we won a play-off game, we hadn't won in

25 years, that's where you get the 22 plus two plus one," Widener said. "We were 0-4 in the playoffs against the Colts. We won that game, we went to the Super Bowl and we won." He notes that every year the shirts have been created, the Chiefs' have won the Super Bowl. The one year they missed, the Chiefs lost to the Buccaneers. Widener has a couple of ideas for this year's shirt. "It will be something with the Chiefs and the Eagles and the 22+2 group," Widener said. "The Brennan family and the three-peat." It would not be a 22+2 gathering if spices were left out of the mix. Wid-

ener said halftime is when things will heat up as far as food offerings at the party. "We are going to eat some very spicy extracts," Widener said. "We're going to start out with jalapeño, habanero, red savina, ghost pepper, Carolina reaper — those are the hot sauces then we are going to kick on the extracts ... psycho slayer, Satan's blood, mad dog plutonium." Members of the group said they are most looking forward to seeing the Chiefs have a chance to do something no team has ever done before — win three Super Bowls in a row. "I'm excited and I am ready for another win," Brennan said.

"That trail can be there to serve disc golf, but it can also be just another recreational leisure nature-type trail that people could take advantage of," Kempf said. Why the course was chosen was a unique result in and of itself, as formal development cannot begin until the double-decker bridge replacement project kicks off, potentially as early as 2028.

The project will result in 3.4 acres of property being acquired by the Missouri Department of Transportation in the narrow strip of Riverfront Park by the southern trailhead entrance, a part of Robidoux Landing, as the construction area will take up most of its footprint. In 1989, the city was awarded a grant from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources to receive Land and Water Conservation Funds for the development of a park at Robidoux Landing with recreational attractions and amenities. The recreationally designated property, which also has ties to St. Joseph's history, will therefore require a conversion of use to another area with recreational value by Northwest Parkway, part of an agreement between the city, MoDOT and the U.S. National Parks Service. "We're honoring that grant funding that we received from Missouri Department of Natural Resources, that had to be maintained in some level of recreation," Kempf said. "We looked

at multiple options. Disc golf kind of rose to the upper level of that recreational value." The identified area of Robidoux Landing, which includes a small shelter, trail, gazebo and several history displays, has fallen into a state of disrepair due to repeated vandalism and property damage and is not functioning as a park without utility infrastructure. A large amount of park resources are often spent on corrective maintenance. "It's a difficult facility for us, but I think it's also an important facility. That was occupied by the riverboat, by the original riverboat down here. That was a well-maintained area because there was a constant presence from the riverboat folks that kind of protected it," Kempf said. Robidoux Landing comprises the southernmost portion of the city's Riverfront Master Plan developed in 2019. A considerable portion of planning between the city, community and MoDOT went into re-evaluating the proposed impacts of construction on long-term plans for riverfront development. While a majority of future riverfront development is now expected to shift north near the casino and Remington Nature Center, local officials and MoDOT remain committed to enhancing and maintaining the area as a long-term recreational amenity. "We want to make sure that area of Downtown Riverfront Park in whatever condition or state that it's in, whatever that looks like after the I-229 project is done, that it's still a legitimate

recreational amenity," Kempf said. "That's still good recreation and you've got the river right there and you've got Downtown on the other side of you." One of MoDOT's planned improvements includes exploring extensions of the nearby riverfront trail further south, along with improvements to the trailhead and pedestrian crossing. The nearby pedestrian bridge will not be impacted by the project. **Additional I-229 improvements for Robidoux Landing**

- Replace the existing Riverwalk Trail trailhead shelter with at least a compatible, if not improved structure.
- Improve the pedestrian connection between Francis Street, across the BNSF Railroad tracks, to the southern trailhead.
- Provide opportunities for parking in proximity to the trailhead.
- Investigate options for upgrading the Riverwalk Trail south of the existing trailhead to potentially connect south of its current endpoint during the project design process.

The upcoming design phase of the project will provide more clarity on the new roadway's footprint and how construction will impact adjacent property. MoDOT officials estimate the project could take at least two years to complete, potentially longer. The department has already budgeted \$609,000 in 2026 and 2027 for right-of-way property acquisitions and some preliminary engineering work.





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Trump’s trade war among allies triggers retaliation from Canada and Mexico

TORONTO — Canada and Mexico ordered retaliatory tariffs on American goods in response to sweeping tariffs imposed by U.S. President Donald Trump, and businesses and consumers in both countries questioned Sunday how the new trade war might affect them.

Canada initially ordered tariffs of 25% on American imports starting Feb. 4, including beverages, cosmetics and paper products worth \$20 billion. A second list of goods was to be released soon, including passenger vehicles, trucks, steel and aluminum products, certain fruits and vegetables, beef, pork, dairy products and more. Those goods were estimated to be worth \$85 billion.

Mexico has so far said only that it will impose retaliatory tariffs, without mentioning any rate or products.

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum spoke by phone Saturday after Trump’s administration imposed the new tariffs — 25% on goods from Canada and Mexico, with a lower rate of 10% for Canadian oil, and 10% on imports from China.

Trudeau’s office said in a statement that Canada and Mexico agreed “to enhance the strong bilateral relations” between their countries. Canadian officials have had extensive dialogue with their Mexican counterparts, but a senior Canadian official said he would not go as far as to say the tariff responses were coordinated.

“Now is the time to chose products made right here in Canada,” Trudeau posted Sunday on X. “Check the labels. Let’s do our part. Wherever we can, choose Canada.”

Canada is the largest export market for 36 states, and Mexico is the largest trading partner of the U.S.

Canada and Mexico ordered the tariffs despite Trump’s further threat to increase the duties charged if retaliatory levies are placed on American goods.

“We’re certainly not looking to escalate, but we will stand up for Canada,” Trudeau said late Saturday.

Some authorities in the provinces of Ontario, British Columbia, Quebec, Manitoba Nova Scotia planned to remove American liquor brands from government store shelves.

For instance, the Liquor Control

Board of Ontario sells nearly \$1 billion worth of American wine, beer, spirits and seltzers every year, Ontario Premier Doug Ford pointed out Sunday.

“Not anymore,” Ford said in a statement. Starting Tuesday, they planned to remove American products from their shelves and their catalog. As the only alcohol wholesaler in the province, the board’s action will prevent Ontario-based restaurants and retailers from ordering or restocking U.S. products.

Beyond the official response, people were already thinking of ways to cope with Trump’s decision, including by sharing suggestions on social media for alternatives to American products.

Trudeau addressed Americans directly, saying they the tariffs “will have real consequences for you.”

Trump says Americans could feel ‘some pain’ from his new tariffs

PALM BEACH, Fla. — President Donald Trump said Sunday that Americans could feel “some pain” from the emerging trade war triggered by his tariffs against Canada, Mexico and China, and claimed that Canada would “cease to exist” without its trade surplus with the United States.

The trade penalties that Trump signed Saturday at his Florida resort caused a mix of panic, anger and uncertainty, and threatened to rupture a decades-old partnership on trade in North America while further straining relations with China.

“Canadians are perplexed,” said the country’s U.S. ambassador, Kirsten Hillman. “We view ourselves as your neighbor, your closest friend, your ally.”

By following through on a campaign pledge, Trump may also have simultane-

ously broken his promise to voters in last year’s election that his administration could quickly reduce inflation. That means the same frustration he is facing from other nations might also spread domestically to consumers and businesses.

“WILL THERE BE SOME PAIN? YES, MAYBE (AND MAYBE NOT!),” Trump said in a social media post. “BUT WE WILL MAKE AMERICA GREAT AGAIN, AND IT WILL ALL BE WORTH THE PRICE THAT MUST BE PAID.”

His administration has not said how high that price could be or what improvements would need to be seen in stopping illegal immigration and the smuggling of fentanyl to merit the removal of the tariffs that Trump imposed under the legal justification of an economic emergency. The tariffs are set to launch Tuesday.

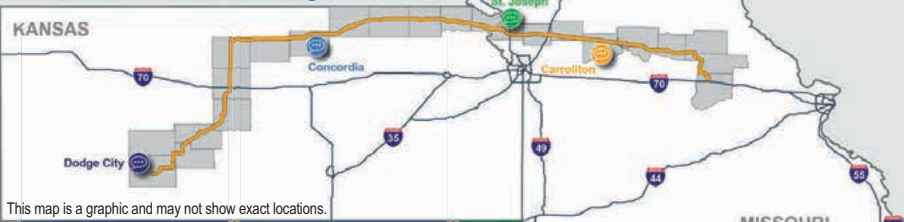

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Officials say remains of 55 victims of midair collision recovered and identified

ARLINGTON, Va. — Families of victims of the deadliest U.S. air disaster since 2001 visited the crash site on Sunday and divers scoured the submerged wreckage for more remains after authorities said they’ve recovered and identified 55 of the 67 people killed.

Washington, D.C. Fire and EMS Chief John Donnelly said officials are confident all will be found. Divers are working diligently to locate remains as crews prepare to lift wreckage from the chilly Potomac River as early as Monday morning, Donnelly said at a news conference.

Col. Francis B. Pera of the Army Corps of Engineers said divers and salvage workers are adhering to strict protocols and will stop moving debris if a body is found. The “dignified recovery” of remains takes precedence over all else, he said.

“Reuniting those lost in this tragic incident is really what keeps us all going,” Pera said. “We’ve got teams that have been working this effort since the beginning, and we’re committed to making this happen.”

Divers have high-definition cameras with feeds monitored on support boats, Pera said, putting “four or five sets of eyes” inside of the wreckage. Owing to the frigid conditions, one diver was treated at a hospital for hypothermia, Donnelly said.

Portions of the two aircraft that collided over

the river Wednesday night near Reagan Washington National Airport — an American Airlines jet with 64 people aboard and an Army Black Hawk helicopter with 3 aboard — will be loaded onto flat-bed trucks and taken to a hangar for investigation.

Family members were taken in buses with a police escort to the Potomac River bank near where the two aircraft came to rest after colliding. The jet, en route from Wichita, Kansas, was about to land. The Black Hawk was on a training mission. There were no survivors.

Federal investigators were working to piece together the events that led to the collision.

The National Transportation Safety Board didn’t hold a press briefing on Sunday, but did release a photograph showing investigators on a small boat looking at wreckage and another of them examining a flight data recorder.

Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy said he wanted to give investigators space to conduct their inquiry. But he posed a range of questions on Sunday morning TV news programs.

“What was happening inside the towers? Were they understaffed? ... The position of the Black Hawk, the elevation of the Black Hawk, were the pilots of the Black Hawk wearing night vision goggles?” Duffy asked on CNN.

Army Staff Sgt. Ryan Austin O’Hara, 28, of Lilburn, Georgia; Chief Warrant Officer 2 Andrew Loyd Eaves, 39, of Great Mills, Maryland; and Capt. Rebecca M. Lobach, of Durham, North Carolina, were in the helicopter.

The plane’s passengers included figure skaters returning from the 2025 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Wichita and a group of hunters returning from a guided trip.

Rubio: Panama must reduce Chinese influence around canal or face possible U.S. action

PANAMA CITY — U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio brought a warning to Panamanian leader José Raúl Mulino on Sunday: Immediately reduce what President Donald Trump says is Chinese influence over the Panama Canal area or face potential retaliation from the United States.

Rubio, traveling to the Central American country and touring the Panama Canal on his first foreign trip as top U.S. diplomat, held face-to-face talks with Mulino, who has resisted pressure from the new U.S. government over management of a waterway that is vital to global trade.

Mulino told reporters after the meeting that Rubio made “no real threat of retaking the canal or the use of force.”

Speaking on behalf of Trump, who has demanded that the canal be returned to U.S. control, Rubio told Mulino that Trump believed that China’s presence in the canal area may violate a treaty that led the United States to turn the waterway over to Panama in 1999. That treaty calls for the permanent neutrality of the American-built canal.

“Secretary Rubio made clear that this status quo is unacceptable and that absent immediate changes, it would require the United States to take measures necessary to protect its rights under the treaty,” the State Department said in a summary of the meeting.

The statement was unusually blunt in diplomatic terms, but in keeping with the tenor and tone Trump has set for foreign policy. Trump has been increasing pressure on Washington’s neighbors and allies, including the canal demand and announcing Saturday that he was imposing major tariffs on Canada and Mexico. That launched a trade war by prompting retaliation from those close allies.

Mulino, meanwhile, called his talks with Rubio “respectful” and “positive” and said he did not “feel like there’s a real threat against the treaty and its validity.”

The president did say Panama would not be renewing its agreement with China’s Belt and Road Initiative when it expires. Panama joined the initiative, which promotes and funds infrastructure and development projects that critics say leave poor member countries heavily indebted to China, after dropping diplomatic recog-

nition of Taiwan and recognizing Beijing.

Rubio later toured the canal at sunset with its administrator, Ricaurte Vásquez, who has said the waterway will remain in Panama’s hands and open to all countries. Rubio crossed the lock and visited the control tower, looking down over the water below, where a red tanker was passing through.

Earlier, about 200 people marched in the capital, carrying Panamanian flags and shouting “Marco Rubio out of Panama,” “Long live national sovereignty” and “One territory, one flag” while the meeting was going on. Some burned a banner with images of Trump and Rubio after being stopped short of the presidential palace by riot police.

Rubio also pressed Trump’s top focus — curbing illegal immigration — telling Panama’s president that it was important to collaborate on the work and thanked him for taking back mi-

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Syria's interim president visits Saudi Arabia on first trip abroad, likely a signal to Iran

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Syria's interim president made his first trip abroad Sunday, traveling to Saudi Arabia in a move likely trying to signal Damascus' shift away from Iran as its main regional ally.

Ahmad al-Sharaa, who was once aligned with al-Qaida, landed in Riyadh alongside his government's foreign minister, Asaad al-Shaibani. The two men traveled on a Saudi jet, with a Saudi flag visible on the table behind them.

Saudi state television trumpeted the fact that al-Sharaa, first known internationally by the nom de guerre Abu Mohammed al-Golani, made Riyadh his first destination.

Syria's new three-star, tricolor flag flew next to Saudi Arabia's own at the airport as al-Sharaa in a suit and tie walked off the plane. He later met with a smiling Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, the kingdom's de facto ruler, at al-Yamamah Palace in Riyadh.

The state-run Saudi Press Agency described their discussions as examining ways to "support the security and stability of sisterly Syria." Syria's state-run SANA news agency quoted al-Sharaa as saying they "worked on raising the level of communication and cooperation in all areas, especially those humanitarian and economic."

Saudi Arabia had been among the Arab nations that poured mon-

ey into insurgent groups that tried to topple President Bashar Assad after Syria's 2011 Arab Spring protests turned into a bloody crackdown. However, its groups found themselves beaten back as Assad, supported by Iran and Russia, fought the war into a stalemate in Syria.

That changed with the December lightning offensive led by al-Sharaa's Hayat Tahrir al-Sham. The group was once affiliated with al-Qaida but has since denounced its former ties.

Al-Sharaa and HTS have carefully managed their public image in the time since, with the interim president favoring an olive-colored military look similar to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, appointing women to roles and trying to maintain ties to Syria's Christian and Shiite Alawite populations.

That also includes keeping both Iran and Russia largely at arms' length as well. Iran has yet to reopen its embassy in Damascus, which had been a key node in running operations through its self-described "Axis of Resistance," including Assad's Syria, Lebanon's Hezbollah militia and other partners.

Russia, Ukraine trade blame over attack on boarding school in Kursk region

KYIV, Ukraine — Competing claims emerged over a deadly attack on a boarding school in Sudzha, a city in Russia's Kursk region that has been under Ukrainian control for five months, with Ukraine and Russia accusing each other of carrying out the strike.

The General Staff of Ukraine's Armed Forces said Saturday night that four people were killed and a further four seriously wounded in the strike, with 84 people rescued by Ukrainian servicemen from the rubble of the building. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said that Moscow had bombed the boarding school where civilians were sheltering and pre-

paring to evacuate.

The General Staff said those in need of additional medical assistance were evacuated to medical facilities in Ukraine.

The Russian Ministry of Defense claimed in the early hours of Sunday that it was Ukrainian forces that had launched a missile strike on the school, saying that the missiles were launched from Ukraine's Sumy region.

Meanwhile, the death toll from a Russian missile strike on an apartment block in the Ukrainian city of Poltava on Saturday rose to 14, including two children, local officials said Sunday. Seventeen people were injured in the attack on the five-story building, Ukraine's State Emergency Service said.

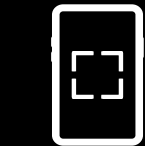

Why Trump's tariffs can't solve America's fentanyl crisis

Americans consume more illicit drugs per capita than anyone else in the world; about 6% of the U.S. population uses them regularly.

One such drug, fentanyl – a synthetic opioid that's 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine – is the leading reason U.S. overdose deaths have surged in recent years. While the rate of fentanyl overdose deaths has dipped a bit recently, it's still vastly higher than it was just five years ago.

Ending the fentanyl crisis won't be easy. The U.S. has an addiction problem that spans decades – long predating the rise of fentanyl – and countless attempts to regulate, legislate and incarcerate have done little to reduce drug consumption. Meanwhile, the opioid crisis alone costs Americans tens of billions of dollars each year.

With past policies having failed to curb fentanyl deaths, President Donald Trump is turning to another tool to fight America's drug problem: trade policy.

During his presidential campaign, Trump pledged to impose tariffs on Canada and Mexico if they didn't halt the flow of drugs across U.S. borders, and on China if it didn't do more to crack down on the production

of chemicals used to make fentanyl. Trump reiterated his plan on his first day back in office, and on Feb. 1, he made good on that threat, imposing tariffs on all three counties and citing fentanyl as a key reason.

Speaking as a professor who studies social policy, I think both fentanyl and the proposed import taxes represent significant threats to the U.S. While the human toll of fentanyl is undeniable, the real question is whether tariffs will work – or worsen what's already a crisis.

Fentanyl: The 'single greatest challenge'

In 2021, more than 107,000 Americans died from overdoses

– the most ever recorded – and nearly seven out of 10 deaths involved fentanyl or similar synthetic opioids. In 2022, fentanyl was killing an average of 200 people each day. And while fentanyl deaths declined slightly in 2023, nearly 75,000 Americans still died from synthetic opioids that year. In March of that year – the most recent for which full-year data on overdose deaths is available – the then-secretary of homeland security declared fentanyl to be “the single greatest challenge we face as a country.”

But history shows that government efforts to curb drug use often have little success.

The first real attempt to regulate drugs in the U.S. occurred

in 1890, when, amid rampant drug abuse, Congress enacted a law taxing morphine and opium. In the years that followed, cocaine use skyrocketed, rising 700% between 1890 and 1902. Cocaine was so popular, it was even found in drinks such as Coca-Cola, from which it got its name.

This was followed by a 1909 act banning the smoking of opium, and, in 1937, the “Marihuana Tax Act.” The most comprehensive package of laws was instituted with the Controlled Substances Act of 1970, which classified drugs into five categories based on their medical uses and potential for abuse or dependence. A year later, then-President Richard Nixon launched the “War on Drugs” and declared drug abuse as “public enemy No. 1.” And in 1986, Congress passed the Anti-Drug Abuse Act, directing US\$1.7 billion for drug enforcement and control.

These policies have generally failed to curb drug supply and use, while also causing significant harm to people and communities of color. For example, between 1980 and 1997, the number of incarcerations for nonviolent drug offenses went from 50,000 to 400,000. But these policies hardly put a dent in consumption. The share of high school seniors using drugs dipped only slightly over the same period, from 65% in 1980 to 58% in 1997.

DID YOU KNOW?

RATE OF CONCUSSIONS

The University of Pittsburgh Medical Center estimates that as many as three million sports- and recreation-related concussions happen each year. Young athletes and their parents must be especially mindful of concussions, as the UPMC notes that two in 10 high school athletes who play contact sports will get a concussion this year. Football might be the sport most think of when pondering the link between sports and concussions, and the UPMC notes that football accounts for roughly 300,000 concussions each year. However, contact sports such as soccer and lacrosse also put athletes at risk for concussion. In fact, the UPMC notes that girls' soccer sees the second most concussions of all high school sports.

Modern home materials drive faster fire response times

Fire department response times have gotten faster, largely due to the kinds of materials used in home construction and home appliances.

According to the U.S.

Administration, many of today's structures can develop from a small flame to a large fire in three to five minutes. Jamey McVicker, St. Joseph Fire Department assistant chief, said this has much to do with the kinds of building materials used

in modern homes and the composition of many newer appliances.

"The contents of the house are mostly petroleum-based now," McVicker said. "In the 1940s and 1950s, most home materials were made of wood, cotton and other natural

fibers, so they wouldn't burn as hot or as quickly."

Today, he said, the kinds of wood used, which can save money, burn more quickly. He cited the common usage of composite woods as opposed to

Bird flu cases causing concern for Northwest Missouri

A "highly pathogenic avian influenza virus," most commonly known as bird flu is spreading across the United States, including in Northwest Missouri.

According to the Missouri Department of Conservation, birds have been tested across the state for the disease and several Northwest

Missouri counties have seen positive test results. These counties include DeKalb, Andrew, Holt and Gentry.

"We did have a die-off in Loess Bluff National Wildlife Refuge, which is also up in that region," said Erin Woodiel, media specialist with the Missouri Department of Conservation. "That is where the disease spreads to

North Shoppes vet clinic expected to open in fall

A new family-owned veterinary clinic is bringing relief to pet owners seeking urgent care for their furry friends.

The owner of the land around 5423 N. Pointe Dr. expects to break ground on the project next week. The property is just north of where the new My Place Hotel opened earlier this month near the Shoppes at North Village.

Austin Haeker, an associate veterinarian at Taylor Animal Hospital of Parkville and Smithville, said he knows there is a need for urgent animal care in the area.

"I wanted to provide that service to the area along with preventative care, like vaccines and heartworm tests, but I knew there was a need for it, and it's something I always wanted to do," Haeker said.

The clinic will not be open 24 hours a day but will provide 24-hour on-call service for emergencies.

"The goal is to someday have staffing there to monitor hospitalized patients (for 24 hours) and then still continue the on-call service," Haeker said.

Many pet owners in the area have shared their hopes on social media for 24-hour emergency care service to come to the area. However, maintaining those hours can be difficult for many establishments due to staffing.

"A lot of that staffing is hard to find, you know, technicians and assistants to monitor patients throughout the evening," Haeker said. "It's even harder to find veterinarians to also stay overnight."

Veterinary science runs in Haeker's family. Haeker graduated from the University of Missouri-Columbia in 2024. His grandfather and father are veterinarians and Haeker's brother is currently enrolled in a veterinary education program.

Haeker noticed the need for veterinary services increase

during the COVID-19 pandemic when many individuals became pet owners.

"That's kind of opened up a spot for someone like me to come in and help when needed," Haeker said.

Haeker plans to build two units for intensive care and light observation.

"If you can't get in for a month at your veterinarian, we'll be there for the community, but on top of that, we'll still have the basic preventative care," Haeker said.

Hiring for the new facility may begin this summer. However, Haeker does not have any other details at this time.

He emphasized that plans for the clinic are not set in stone, though a possible name for the new facility, North Pointe Veterinary Clinic and Urgent Care, has been discussed.

"We're very excited," Haeker said. "It's something I enjoy doing. I like fixing problems and being there for people who need it."

natural woods in many homes.

"These may save thousands of dollars on the cost of the home," McVicker said, "but composite wood burns faster, just like sawdust burns faster than a piece of wood."

Fire departments nationwide have been working to increase response times because of the issue. The St. Joseph Fire Department's response time goal is five minutes. However, McVicker points out that the burn time of certain types of wood in an attic or a basement may be around five minutes. This means that even if firefighters meet the goal response time, it may be too late to save some structures.

"This reality puts a lot of pressure on our first responders when it comes to critical decision-making," McVicker said. "Our priority is always to save lives and

the entire flock, and we have a massive amount of birds that all die from influenza as opposed to just finding one or two."

Officials said it's mostly snow geese that have tested positive for the disease in Northwest Missouri. However, they confirmed that this type of bird has flown mostly toward southern areas of the state this deep into the winter season, so fewer positive tests are appearing.

The positive tests are only in individual raptors, which can be transmitted

to save property. Once people are safe, we have to make decisions based upon what we know about burn times, about whether we will be able to save the property or we have to pull out due to imminent danger of the building collapsing."

Part of the training of new firefighters in St. Joseph involves becoming familiar with the age of the houses in the area, as well as the construction process of new homes and buildings in the area.

McVicker said construction materials and burn time are things the department has to adapt to but there are still important safety measures homeowners can take to prevent a fire from starting and spreading.

He said homeowners should avoid overloading outlets, which includes limiting the usage of extension cords. He also suggested avoiding the misuse of alternative heat sources.

Finally, if you are adding on to the house, seeking out an electrician and a building professional for advice, even if you are doing the construction yourself, can save you fire damage in the future.

to domestic animals such as poultry.

Conservation experts said that avian influenza being contracted by humans is rare and not considered an immediate emergency, but people should use caution when coming in contact with birds.

"We largely see avian influenza being transmitted from bird species to bird species, especially ones, that are wild birds such as raptors or waterfowl," Woodiel said. "But we still urge that people use common sense when finding dead birds on the ground and don't touch them. If you are concerned about them, report it to your county's conservation agent."

With home prices high, many families
find the American dream out of reach

The Petersen family’s two-bedroom apartment in northern California is starting to feel small. Four-year-old Jerrik’s toy monster trucks are everywhere in the 1,100-square-foot unit in Campbell, just outside of San Jose. And it’s only a matter of time before 9-month-old Carolynn starts amassing more toys, adding to the disarray, says her mother, Jenn Petersen. The 42-year-old chiropractor had hoped she and her husband, Steve, a 39-year-old dental hygienist, would have bought a house by now. But when they can afford a bigger place, it will have to be another rental. Petersen has done the math: With mortgage rates and home prices stubbornly high, there’s no way the couple, who make about \$270,000 a year and pay about \$2,500 in monthly rent, can afford a home anywhere in their area. According to October data from the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, a San Jose family with a median income of \$156,700 would need to spend 80% of their income on housing — including an \$8,600 monthly mortgage payment — to own a median-priced \$1.54 million home. That’s far higher than the general rule of thumb

that people should pay no more than 30% of their income on a mortgage or rent. Moving out of state is out of the question for the Petersens — they have strong family ties to the area and their income would plummet if they move to a lower cost-of-living area. “I’m not willing to give up my job and close connections with my family for a house,” Petersen said. The issue is widespread and near historic highs nationally: As of last fall, the median homeowner in the U.S. was paying 42% of their income on homeownership costs, according to the Atlanta Fed. Four years ago, that percentage was 28% and had not previously reached 38% since late 2007, just before the housing market crash. “The American dream, as our parents knew it, doesn’t exist anymore,” Petersen said. “The whole idea that you get a house after you graduate college, get a steady job and get married? I’ve done most of those milestones. But the homeownership part? That just doesn’t fit financially.” First-time homeowners are getting older The same is true for an increasing number of American families. In 2024, the median first-time homebuyer was 38 years old, a jump from

age 35 the previous year, according to a recent report by the National Association of Realtors. That’s significantly above historic norms, when median first-time buyers hovered between 30 and 32 years old from 1993 to 2018. The biggest driver of this trend, experts said, is simple: There are far too few houses on the market to match pent-up demand, driving prices past the point of affordability for many people who are relatively early in their careers. Coupled with high mortgage rates, many have concluded that renting is their only option. “Wage growth hasn’t kept up with the increase in home prices and interest rates,” said Domonic Purviance, who studies housing at the Atlanta Fed. “Even though people are making more money, home prices are increasing at a faster rate.” That gap has left many out of the housing market, which for generations has been a way for Americans to build equity and wealth that they can pass down or leverage to buy a larger home. It’s also led to widespread worries about housing in the U.S. About 7 in 10 voters under age 45 said they were “very” concerned about the cost of housing in their community, according to AP VoteCast, a survey of more than 120,000 voters in the 2024 election.

‘Dog Man’ bites off \$36 million, taking No. 1 at box office

NEW YORK | DreamWorks Animation’s “Dog Man” fetched \$36 million in ticket sales at the weekend box office, according to studio estimates Sunday, making it the biggest debut yet in 2025. It was a big opening for the Universal Pictures release adapted from the popular graphic novel series by author Dav Pilkey. The big-screen launch for the cartoon canine was produced for a modest \$40 million, meaning it will easily coast through a profitable run. Audiences gave it an “A” CinemaScore. Only one animated film before has had a better January launch: 2016’s “Kung Fu Panda 3.” “Dog Man,” though, was soft overseas, collecting \$4.2 million from 29 international markets. The voice cast of the Peter Hastings-directed movie is led by Pete Davidson, Lil Rel Howery and Isla Fisher. Family movies last year buoyed the box office, with PG-rated films accounting for \$2.9 billion, or 33% of all ticket revenue, according to data firm Comscore. So far, they’re lifting 2025, too. The Walt

The horror comedy “Companion,” from Warner Bros. and New Line, also opened well, with \$9.5 million in 3,285 locations. Drew Hancock’s sci-fi tinged film set in the near future is about a group of friends on a weekend lakeside getaway.

Julie Stewart-Binks accuses a top executive of sexual assault

A former FOX Sports reporter and anchor filed a lawsuit Friday against the network and top executive Charlie Dixon, saying he sexually assaulted her after coaxing her up to his hotel room to discuss Super Bowl plans in 2016 and was later pushed out of her job for fighting back. Julie Stewart-Binks said in her complaint, filed in Los Angeles County Superior Court, that she was inspired to speak up after a former hairstylist for FOX Sports filed a lawsuit on Jan. 5 saying a former host had made repeated unwanted sexual advances toward

her and that Dixon had groped her. Andrew Fegyveresi, a spokesperson for FOX, said in an email that the claims had been addressed.

Jon Hamm honored as Harvard’s Hasty Pudding Man of the Year

Actor Jon Hamm, who rose to fame as ad executive Don Draper on the AMC series “Mad Men” and more recently appeared in “ Fargo” and “Landman,” was honored Friday night as the 2025 Man of the Year by Harvard University’s Hasty Pudding Theatricals. The theater group, which dates to 1844 and claims to be the world’s third-oldest still operating, said Hamm will receive his Pudding Pot award at a celebratory roast. Afterward, he will attend a performance of Hasty Pudding Theatricals’ 176th production, “101 Damnations.” “I can’t believe there are so many people here,” Hamm said after accepting his Pudding Pot award. “Did you all seriously think I was dead? This is such a wonderful honor.” Before accepting the Pudding Pot, Hamm endured a roasting at the hands of two members of the Hasty Pudding Theatricals. They mocked his height, poked fun at the fact he had not won an Academy Award and suggested many previous winners were better looking.

Each year, Valentine's Day presents many opportunities for couples to show one another just how much they care. One of the ways they often do so is through homemade dinners and desserts in which love and affection are two of the most vital ingredients.

Few people will turn away a bite of something sweet come February 14th, but some may have a hankering for something other than chocolate or strawberries. Atholl Brose is a fifteenth-century Scottish drink that is similar to the popular Irish cream liqueurs. When mixed into a no-bake cheesecake batter, it can be the perfect flavoring for a creamy dessert few can resist.

Atholl Brose Cheesecake

Serves 4 to 6

For the Atholl Brose

➤ 250 ml (1 cup) whiskey

➤ 70 grams (2½ ounces) oats

➤ 3 teaspoons honey

➤ 40 ml (2 tablespoons + 2 tea-spoons) double cream

For the cheesecake

➤ 100 grams (3½ ounces) butter

➤ 250 grams (9 ounces) digestive biscuits, crushed

➤ 600 grams (1 pound, 5 ounces) cream cheese

➤ 35 ml (2 tablespoons + 1 tea-spoon) Atholl Brose

➤ 100 grams (31/2 ounces) icing sugar

➤ 300 ml (1¼ cup) double cream

➤ 100 grams (3½ ounces) dark chocolate, grated

To make the Atholl Brose: Pour the whiskey over the oats in a bowl and rest under a clean dish towel for 24 hours.

The next day, use a muslin (or cotton dish towel) to squeeze out the whiskey into a fresh bowl. Be sure to get every last drop! You can discard the oats.

Warm up your honey for 10 seconds in the microwave, or over a low heat in a small pan, and whisk into the Brose mix.

Add your cream and whisk again. Now let it rest in the fridge for at least 4 hours.

To make the cheesecake: First, melt the butter in a pan, remove the heat and add the crushed digestive biscuits. Mix well until the biscuits have absorbed all the butter.

Press into the bottom of a lined 18 cm (7-inch) spring-form tin. Place in the fridge and allow to set for an hour.

Meanwhile, prepare the filling. Lightly whip the cream cheese, then beat in the Atholl Brose and icing sugar. Whip the cream and fold in along with the grated chocolate. When smooth, spoon evenly onto the biscuit base.

Refrigerate and allow to set for a further 2 hours, then serve with a dram of Atholl Brose.

Note: Double cream is challenging to find outside of the United Kingdom. Therefore, an approximate substitution can me made my mixing 1 cup of heavy cream with 1 table-spoon of buttermilk in a lidded jar. Shake for 1 minute. Then wrap the jar in a towel and allow to sit at room temperature for 12 hours until thickened.; otherwise, use heavy cream, which has a slightly lower fat content, in the recipe.

The trade was put together in secret, with only a precious few people knowing what was happening. Luka Doncic didn't know. Anthony Davis didn't know. Their coaches didn't know. Their teammates didn't know.

And then it happened — an absolute blockbuster. Doncic led the Dallas Mavericks to the NBA Finals last season,

Davis won a championship with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2020 and now they're switching teams in a move that stunned most everyone in the league.

"I thought I'd spend my career here, and I wanted so badly to bring you a championship," Doncic said in a written farewell message to Mavs fans. "The love and support you all have given me is more than I could have ever

dreamed of."

Doncic was traded by the reigning Western Conference champion Mavericks to the Lakers for Davis as part of a three-team deal. The trade was announced Sunday morning after the teams got the required league approval.

The trade talks, which took place over about a month, were kept extremely tight-lipped

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. — Rory McIlroy played a game nearly as magnificent as the Pebble Beach scenery Sunday as he powered his way past a pack of contenders and closed with a 6-under 66 for a two-shot victory in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am.

McIlroy is one of the top attractions in golf, which only added to the appeal of the surprising sunshine and crashing surf at America's most famous coastal golf course. And just like that, a sleepy start to the PGA Tour season had some life to it.

On a day when six players had at least a share of the lead, McIlroy took the top spot for good with an 18-foot birdie putt on the 10th hole into a stiff breeze along the Pacific. He effectively ended the drama with a towering drive and a 7-iron

The NFC tops the AFC in the Pro Bowl Games again

ORLANDO, Fla. — With Olympic flag football three years away, this much is becoming clear: the U.S. team should want a former LSU receiver on its roster.

The four ex-Tigers competing in the Pro Bowl

Games scored a combined eight touchdowns in a flag football contest that capped the NFC's third consecutive victory over the AFC, 76-63 on Sunday.

Rookie Malik Nabers of the New York Giants found the end zone twice for the NFC, and Minneso-

ta's Justin Jefferson also scored. Jefferson caught six passes for 46 yards. Nabers finished with five receptions for 62 yards.

"We're on top for sure," Jefferson said. "It is definitely great to see the guys having fun out here, scoring touchdowns, just mak-

ing big plays. That's what we normally do, so it's good to see us coming out here and doing the same thing."

The NFC essentially sealed the win by returning two interceptions for touchdowns in the second half, giving coach Eli

Manning a third consecutive win over big brother and AFC coach Peyton. Arizona's Budda Baker and Minnesota's Byron Murphy delivered the big defensive plays in a made-for-TV event designed to showcase offense.

Jared Goff, who got the

NFC off to a strong start with his near-perfect performance in a skills competition Thursday, completed 10 of 11 passes for 126 yards and three touchdowns. Goff and Murphy earned MVP honors.

Fay Vincent, former baseball commissioner, dies at 86

NEW YORK | Fay Vincent, who became an unexpected baseball commissioner in 1989 following the death of A. Bartlett Giamatti and then was forced out three years later by owners intent on a labor confrontation with players, has died. He was 86.

Vincent had undergone radiation and chemotherapy for bladder cancer and developed complications that included bleeding, said his wife, Christina. He asked that treatment be stopped and died Saturday at a hospital in Vero Beach, Florida.

“Mr. Vincent served the game during a time of many challenges, and he remained proud of his association with our national pastime throughout his life,” current commissioner Rob Manfred said in a statement.

Fans at Raptors game continue trend of booing U.S. national anthem

TORONTO | Fans at a Toronto Raptors game continued an emerging trend Sunday of booing the American national anthem at pro sporting events in Canada.

Fans of the NBA's lone Canadian franchise booed the anthem after similar reactions broke out Saturday night at NHL games in Ottawa, Ontario, and Calgary, Alberta, hours after U.S. President Donald Trump made his threat of import tariffs on America's northern neighbor reality.

After initially cheering for the 15-year-old female singer, fans booed throughout “The Star-Spangled Banner” performance. At the end, mixed boos and cheers could be heard before the crowd erupted in applause for the Canadian anthem, “O Canada.”

Raptors forward Chris Boucher, a Canadian citizen, was asked after his team's win over the Los Angeles Clippers whether he'd ever experienced something like that.

A Lim Kim opens LPGA season by holding off Nelly Korda

ORLANDO, FLA. | A Lim Kim responded to a late charge by Nelly Korda with three birdies on her final four holes for a 5-under 67 and a two-shot victory Sunday in the LPGA season opener at the Hilton Grand Vacations Tournament of Champions.

Korda, coming off her seven-win season, holed a 3-foot birdie putt on the par-5 15th to tie for the lead. Kim was in the final group behind her and matched the birdie to regain the lead.

Kim seized control with a 20-foot birdie putt on the 16th for a two-shot lead, and she capped off her wire-to-wire win with a 25-foot birdie putt on the 18th.

“So fun, so good. And then I'm hungry,” Kim said when asked to describe how she was feeling.

Korda closed with a 65 at Lake Nona to start her season with a runner-up finish.

“Yeah, not bad,” Korda said. “I'm never going to complain finishing second in a tournament and giving it a run, especially on a Sunday. There are definitely a couple putts I would like to have back, but overall I think I'm very happy with this week and excited for next week.”

Chile's Garin refuses to play on after changeover collision

HASSELT, BELGIUM | Belgium advanced to the second round of Davis Cup qualifying in bizarre circumstances Sunday after Chile tennis player Cristian Garin was accidentally knocked over by his opponent and refused to continue their match.

Belgium's Zizou Bergs was celebrating as he sprinted toward his bench after winning a game in the third set that left him serving for the match. Garin was approaching the narrow space between the net and the umpire's chair at the same time and the two collided, with Bergs catching Garin in the right eye with his right shoulder.

Bergs immediately apologized and Garin had to receive medical treatment. In a statement later Sunday, the International Tennis Federation described it as “an accidental collision at the change of ends” and said “the independent doctor ruled Garin was fit to continue.”

But the Chilean refused to continue, with his team calling for Bergs to be disqualified. Instead, Garin received three consecutive time violations, which led to a game penalty and him losing the set and match.

of French words — as well as many last names in Louisiana — that end with the letters “eaux.”

Super Bowl week comes a month after a terrorist attack on Bourbon Street in the city's famed French Quarter in the early-morning hours of Jan. 1, during which a man drove a truck over the sidewalk and into pedestrians, killing 14 people before he was killed in a shootout with police.

Security was tight at the airport for the Super Bowl arrivals. Media members were kept behind barricades about 50 yards away from where the teams made their way from their planes to buses, and there were no interviews.

The Eagles (17-3) advanced to the Super Bowl by beating the Washington Commanders 55-23 in the NFC championship game.

The Chiefs (17-2), who are seeking to become the first team to win three straight Super Bowls, took the AFC crown with a 32-29 victory over the Buffalo Bills.

The arrivals kicked off a week of activities leading up

to the first Super Bowl in New Orleans since 2013.

“This is the first day of the culmination of eight years of planning,” said Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation and New Orleans Super Bowl Host Committee president Jay Cicero, alluding to the time since the city won its bid for this season's title game.

“It's a little surreal that the teams are arriving,” he said. “We're excited that this is happening. It's time to get going.”

Cicero, who was at the airport for the arrivals, noted that a University of New Orleans study concluded that the 2013 Super Bowl resulted in about \$480 million in spending

in the metropolitan area.

“It's certainly going to be higher than that 12 years later,” he said.

Cicero said more than 6,000 media credentials have been issued for the Super Bowl, up from around 5,200 in 2013 and double the number issued for the 1997 Super Bowl in New Orleans.

into the 571-yard 14th hole, setting up an eagle putt from just outside 25 feet.

“To win at one of the cathedrals of golf is really cool,” McIlroy said.

Shane Lowry fell out of a share for the lead when he sent his second shot over a cliff to the right of the par-5 sixth. But he shot 31 on the back nine, including a birdie on the final hole for a 68 that gave him second place alone.

Lucas Glover (67) and Justin Rose (68) were another shot behind. Sepp Straka, who started the final round with a one-shot lead, had a 72 and tied for seventh.

Scottie Scheffler, the world's No. 1 player whose season was delayed by minor hand surgery from punctured glass while making ravioli, closed with a 67 and tied for ninth.

McIlroy has talked about this being an important year for him, though his focus was more on April through September — an 11th chance to complete the career Grand Slam at the Masters, a return home to Northern Ireland for the

British Open, a road Ryder Cup at Bethpage.

This wasn't a bad start.

“It's a really cool way to start the season,” said McIlroy, who won for the second time in California. “To get this win this early means a great deal, and hopefully I'll keep the momentum going into Torrey Pines in a couple weeks' time.”

The sixth hole began to separate the pack a little. In consecutive groups, Rose went over the cliff with his tee shot and Tom Kim hit down the hill toward the ocean with his second shot. Lowry followed him in the final group, leading to bogey.

But really, McIlroy looked as though he was the player to beat from the second hole, when he hit a tough pitch from 50 yards away over a bunker to a back pin with enough height and spin to set up a 2-foot birdie putt.

But it was after his lone bogey on the tough eighth hole where he pulled away — the 18-foot birdie on the 10th, a tee shot into 8 feet for birdie on the par-3 12th and finally get his due on the 14th hole. McIlroy drilled his drive for the third straight day over a tree, over the bunker complex and into the fairway. The previous two days, he had to settle for par.

by Mavericks general manager Nico Harrison and Lakers GM Rob Pelinka.

Mavs coach Jason Kidd's first reaction? “Shock,” Kidd said, though he later added that he believes it's the right move for his team going forward.

Maxi Kleber and Markieff Morris also headed to the Lakers, while Max Christie went to Dallas. The Utah Jazz also were involved, getting Jalen Hood-Schifino and a 2025 second-rounder from both the Mavs and Lakers.

“Sports are about transformative moments,” Pelinka said. “We are inspired by these moments Lakers fans know, expect and love with a franchise that continually ushers in new eras of greatness. ... Luka is a one-of-a-kind, young global superstar who will lead this franchise for years to come. His killer instincts and commitment to winning championships will be a driving force for the team.”

The trade news broke shortly after the Lakers beat the Knicks at Madison Square Garden. Davis was not with the Lakers for the game; he has been in Los

Angeles because of an abdominal injury that needed assessing.

Doncic has not played for Dallas since Christmas, when he exited a game with a strained left calf. The trade may come at a serious price for Doncic, who now can't sign a five-year supermax contract extension this summer that could have been worth around \$345 million.

It was never clear if the Mavs would have offered such a massive deal. Doncic also would have had an option to leave as a free agent after the 2025-26 season, and it's certain that other teams with hopes of landing the Slovenian star would have planned for such scenarios.

“There's other teams that were loading up,” Harrison said Sunday. “He was going to be able to make his own decision at some point of whether he wants to be here or not, whether we want to supermax him or not, or whether he wants to opt out. We had to take all that into consideration and I feel like we got out in front of what could have been a tumultuous summer.”

Doncic is still eligible for an extension this summer, with the max that the Lakers could offer him being five years at about \$230 million — a \$115 million difference than what the supermax could have been.
